## Summary of Legislation

Under current law, local emergency management agencies must maintain an emergency management plan with provisions for the preparation, prevention, mitigation, response, and recovery from emergencies and disasters. For any plan amended or created on or after July 1, 2024, this bill strongly encourages agencies to address the needs of individuals with animals during an emergency, and include provisions for the evacuation, shelter, and transport of individuals with an animal. Beginning January 2025, cities and counties are also strongly encouraged to make information for animal emergency preparedness available to the public

## Local Government

Local governments and local emergency management agencies that choose to revise existing plans will have a minimal increase in workload; however, reviewing, updating, and maintaining emergency plans, and maintaining communications with the public, are part of the general operations of these agencies, and this bill will not create a material cost for local governments or their subdivisions.

**Effective Date**

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.
