The bill may reduce state revenue and expenditures beginning in FY 2024-25. **Appropriation** No appropriation is required. **Summary:** 

### **Summary of Legislation**

Fiscal Note Status:

The bill requires courts to award reasonable attorney fees to local governments who win any case involving a judicial review of a local land use decision involving residential use of certain densities, unless the person brining forward the case is the land use applicant. The bill also allows governments to treat a local land use decision as valid while any judicial review of the case is pending.

The final fiscal note reflects the enacted bill.

### **State Revenue and Expenditures**

The bill will impact state revenue and expenditures in two ways. First, to the extent the bill decreases the number of civil lawsuits related to local land use decisions by discouraging plaintiffs from bringing forward a case unless they expect to prevail, courts will have a decrease in workload and collect less filing fees. Conversely, workload to trial courts will increase to determine reasonable attorney fees in cases where the defendant prevails. Overall, the bill is expected to minimally impact revenue and workload in the trial courts. No change in appropriations is required.

#### **Local Government**

Similar to the state, revenue and workload to the Denver County Court will be impacted by a reduced number of civil cases, and more time to determine attorney fees. This impact is expected to be minimal. In addition, local governments may have reduced litigation costs over land use decisions if the bill results in a decrease in civil cases.

#### **Effective Date**

The bill was signed into law by the Governor and took effect on May 30, 2024.
