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Summary of Legislation

The bill expands the scope of the Behavioral Health-Care Continuum Gap Grant Program to include awarding a community investment grant for a new capital construction project and transfers \$4 million from the General Fund to the Behavioral and Mental Health Cash Fund for that purpose.

State Transfers

The bill transfers \$4 million from the General Fund to the Behavioral and Mental Health Cash Fund in the Behavioral Health Administration (BHA). This is a one-time transfer in FY 2024-25.

State Expenditures

The bill increases state expenditures in the BHA by \$4 million in FY 2024-25, paid from the Behavioral and Mental Health Cash Fund to fund grants for capital construction projects. Workload in the BHA will increase to review any capital construction grant requests received under the expanded program. This work can be accomplished within existing appropriations.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect upon signature of the Governor, or upon becoming law without his signature.

State Appropriations

For FY 2024-25 the bill requires an appropriation of \$4,000,000 from the Behavioral and Mental Health Cash Fund to the Behavioral Health Administration.
