Bill Topic: ACCESS TO STATE GRANT OPPORTUNITIES

Summary of Fiscal Impact:

The bill would have created a state grant database and a program to help local governments identify and apply for grants. It would have increased state expenditures, and impacted local government revenues and expenditures beginning in FY 2024-25.

Appropriation Summary: For FY 2024-25, the bill would have required an appropriation of \$638,596 to two state agencies.

Fiscal Note Status: The final fiscal note reflects the introduced bill, as amended by the House State, Civic, Military, & Veterans Affairs Committee. The bill was deemed lost in the House Appropriations Committee on May 9, 2024; therefore, the impacts identified in this analysis do not take effect.

**Summary of Legislation**

By December 31, 2025, the bill requires the Department of Personnel and Administration (DPA) to create a publically accessible database with specified information concerning grant opportunities that are funded with state money, or administered by the state.

The bill also creates the Grant Assistance to Rural Communities Program in the Department of Local Affairs (DOLA) to assist public and private rural entities to identify and apply for grant opportunities. The department must adopt rules for administration, and designate one or more employees residing in rural communities to implement the program.

**State Expenditures**

The bill increases state General Fund expenditures by \$741,000 million in FY 2024-25 and by \$664,000 in FY 2025-26 and ongoing. Expenditures, which are in the DPA and DOLA, are shown in Table 2 and detailed below.

**Department of Personnel and Administration.** The DPA will have staffing and system costs to develop the grant database.

- **Staff.** Beginning in FY 2024-25, the DPA requires 1.0 FTE to continually manage the state database and provide training and assistance to state agencies using the database. Costs are prorated for a September 1, 2024, start date.
- **System Costs.** The DPA requires \$135,000 initially in FY 2024-25, and \$5,000 annually thereafter for system maintenance, to create the state grant database. This estimate is based on past system costs in the department. This work will be done by the Office of Information Technology, using reappropriated funds from DPA.

**Department of Local Affairs.** DOLA will have staffing and travel costs to implement the grant assistance program.

- **Staff.** Beginning in FY 2024-25, DOLA requires 6.0 FTE to provide grant assistance to eligible rural entities. Staff will provide grant research, grant writing services, and technical assistance for eligible rural communities, including up to 42 counties, 201 municipalities, and the public or private organizations and school districts in those areas. The fiscal note assumes 60 entities will receive support from staff in identifying eligible grants and grant writing, and 120 entities will be assisted with grant performance and provided with technical assistance. To the extent that a greater number of entities request assistance, additional FTE to manage the workload will be requested through the budget process. Staff costs are prorated for a September 1, 2024, start date.
- **Travel and lodging costs.** DOLA requires approximately \$82,000 annually for staff travel to provide services to eligible entities in rural areas of the state, including costs for mileage and lodging reimbursements. The fiscal note assumes an annual 84,000 miles reimbursed at \$0.60 per mile for 6.0 FTE to each complete two, 140 mile roundtrips to rural entities per week, and to have two overnight stays per month at \$220 per night.

**Other state agencies.** Workload will increase for state departments to submit grant information to the database. This workload will be minimal and can be accomplished within existing appropriations.

## Local Government

The bill may impact workload and revenue for any local government entity that receives grant assistance through the program or that applies for and receives grant funding.

## Effective Date

The bill takes effect 90 days following adjournment of the General Assembly sine die, assuming no referendum petition is filed.

## **State Appropriations**

For FY 2024-25, the bill requires General Fund appropriations totaling \$638,596 as follows:

- \$193,370 to the Department of Personnel and Administration, and 0.8 FTE, of which \$135,000 is reappropriated to the Office of Information Technology; and
- \$445,226 to the Department of Local Affairs, and 5.0 FTE.
