| Fiscal Note<br>Status:              | The final fiscal note reflects the introduced bill. This bill was postponed indefinitely by the Senate Local Government and Housing Committee on February 29, 2024; therefore, the impacts identified in this analysis do not take effect. |  |  |

## **Summary of Legislation**

The bill requires that counties and municipalities evaluate the cost-effectiveness of potential changes to their energy codes and prohibits them from adopting changes that are not cost effective beginning January 1, 2026. The bill specifies that cost-effectiveness requires a net economic benefit over a ten-year period.

#### **Local Government**

The bill increases costs for counties and municipalities to evaluate proposed amendments that are adopted after January 1, 2026, to their energy codes for cost-effectiveness. This cost is expected to vary depending on the scope of the proposed amendment and the local government's administrative structure.

#### **Technical Note**

In the introduced bill, the requirements for municipal codes take effect January 1, 2026, whereas the requirements for county codes take effect right away. The fiscal note assumes that both requirements take effect at the same time, in 2026.

#### **Effective Date**

The bill takes effect 90 days following adjournment of the General Assembly sine die, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
