	The bill requires the Colorado State Patrol to provide law enforcement and security services for the Judicial Department. Starting in FY 2024-25, the bill increases state expenditures on an ongoing basis.

Summary of Legislation

The bill requires the Colorado State Patrol (CSP) in the Department of Public Safety (CDPS) to provide law enforcement services at the Ralph L. Carr Judicial Center and its grounds. The CSP is also required to provide protection to state judges and justices when they are present in the capitol complex. Additionally, the bill grants temporary peace officer status to newly hired administrators of judicial security pending application and review by the Peace Officers Standards and Training Board (POST Board).

Background

Under current law, the CDPS is not required to provide security services for the Judicial Department. An interagency agreement between the CDPS and the Judicial Department provides security at the judicial center during daytime hours, with costs for these services paid from the Justice Center Cash Fund reappropriated to the CDPS.

State Expenditures

To the extent the bill requires additional security services to be provided by either the CDPS or the Judicial Department, the bill increases state expenditures, paid from the Justice Center Cash Fund in the Judicial Department. No change in appropriations is required at this time, and any additional spending authority required will be sought through the annual budget process.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor and took effect on May 31, 2024.
