A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING THE USE OF TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES TO ADDRESS
 102 SCHOOL SAFETY.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at <u>http://leg.colorado.gov.</u>)

On or before September 1, 2025, the bill requires the office of school safety (office) to convene and oversee a work group to develop best practices for the use of trauma-informed practices to conduct school safety drills.

No later than June 30, 2026, the bill requires the work group to develop recommendations to support schools in training school personnel on the use of trauma-informed practices in conducting school safety drills, how to best conduct school safety drills in a trauma-informed manner, and how to best respond to a school safety incident. The recommendations must be submitted to the office and the house and senate education committees, or their successor committees; the governor; the state board; the commissioner of education; and the department of education.

1	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:
2	SECTION 1. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly
3	finds and declares that:
4	(a) Colorado is facing a growing mental health crisis among its
5	youth, with increasing rates of anxiety, depression, and other mental
6	health issues that significantly impact students' ability to learn and thrive
7	in school environments;
8	(b) The rise in school shootings and climate-related disasters have
9	increasingly disrupted the lives of Colorado youth, which contributes to
10	the mental health challenges and trauma students face, and the long term
11	effects of these events can impair a youth's emotional well-being, ability
12	to focus, and academic success;
13	(c) The safety and well-being of students and school personnel in
14	Colorado is a paramount concern;
15	(d) School safety drills are an essential part of school safety
16	protocols to prepare students and school personnel for emergency
17	situations;
18	(e) Traditional school safety drills can be distressing and
19	traumatizing for students and educators, thereby necessitating a more
20	considerate approach;
21	(f) Trauma-informed practices have been shown to reduce the
22	psychological impact of school safety drills on participants, fostering a

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1 safer and more supportive school environment;

2 (g) Recognizing the unique vulnerabilities of students, it is
3 essential to include their perspectives and representation in efforts to
4 create a safe and supportive school environment; and

- (h) Implementing trauma-informed school safety drills helps
 maintain the mental health and emotional stability of students and school
 personnel during and after the school safety drills.
- 8 SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, add 24-33.5-2705 as
 9 follows:

10 24-33.5-2705. Trauma-informed practices for school safety
11 drills - work group - creation - purpose - membership - definitions.
12 (1) As used in this section, unless the context otherwise
13 REQUIRES:

14 (a) "PARENT" MEANS A PARENT, LEGAL GUARDIAN, OR ANY OTHER
15 PERSON HAVING LEGAL CUSTODY OF A STUDENT.

16 (b) "School safety drill" Means an operations-based
17 EXERCISE THAT IS DESIGNED TO PREPARE STUDENTS AND SCHOOL
18 PERSONNEL TO RESPOND TO SPECIFIC EMERGENCIES IN AN EFFORT TO
19 REINFORCE SAFETY PROTOCOLS, NURTURE READINESS, AND REDUCE PANIC
20 DURING A SCHOOL SAFETY INCIDENT.

(c) "SCHOOL SAFETY INCIDENT" MEANS AN EVENT THAT OCCURS
ON SCHOOL GROUNDS THAT PUTS PROPERTY OR THE HEALTH, SAFETY, OR
WELL-BEING OF STUDENTS, SCHOOL STAFF, OR VISITORS IN DANGER AND
REQUIRES AN IMMEDIATE RESPONSE.

(d) "TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES" MEANS A SYSTEMATIC
 APPROACH THAT RECOGNIZES THE PREVALENCE OF ADVERSE AND
 TRAUMATIC EXPERIENCES OF SCHOOL SAFETY DRILLS AND EQUIPS SCHOOL

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PERSONNEL WITH KNOWLEDGE TO RECOGNIZE TRAUMA AND STRATEGIES
 TO SUPPORT STUDENTS AND SCHOOL PERSONNEL WHO EXPERIENCE
 TRAUMA.

4 (2) ON OR BEFORE SEPTEMBER 1, 2025, THE OFFICE SHALL
5 CONVENE AND OVERSEE A WORK GROUP AS DESCRIBED IN THIS SECTION.
6 THE PURPOSE OF THE WORK GROUP IS TO DEVELOP BEST PRACTICES FOR
7 THE USE OF TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES TO CONDUCT SCHOOL SAFETY
8 DRILLS.

9 (3) THE WORK GROUP SHALL OBTAIN INPUT FROM PARENTS AND
10 STUDENTS WHO REFLECT THE DIVERSITY OF THE STATE WITH REGARD TO
11 RACE, ETHNICITY, IMMIGRATION STATUS, SOCIOECONOMIC STATUS,
12 GEOGRAPHY, AND DISABILITY.

13 (4) (a) (I) THE WORK GROUP CONSISTS OF THE FOLLOWING
14 NONVOTING MEMBERS:

15 (A) THE COMMISSIONER OF EDUCATION, OR THE COMMISSIONER OF
16 EDUCATION'S DESIGNEE;

17 (B) A REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE BEHAVIORAL HEALTH
18 ADMINISTRATION CREATED IN SECTION 27-50-203, APPOINTED BY THE
19 COMMISSIONER OF THE BEHAVIORAL HEALTH ADMINISTRATION;

20 (C) A REPRESENTATIVE FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC
21 SAFETY, APPOINTED BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR;

(D) A STUDENT WHO ATTENDS A COLORADO PUBLIC SCHOOL,APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR.

24 (II) THE WORK GROUP CONSISTS OF THE FOLLOWING VOTING25 MEMBERS:

26 (A) THE DIRECTOR, OR THE DIRECTOR'S DESIGNEE, WHO IS THE
27 CHAIRPERSON OF THE WORK GROUP;

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1 (B) THREE SCHOOL DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS, OR THEIR 2 RESPECTIVE DESIGNEES, ONE OF WHOM MUST REPRESENT AN URBAN 3 SCHOOL DISTRICT; ONE OF WHOM MUST REPRESENT A RURAL SCHOOL 4 DISTRICT; AND ONE OF WHOM MUST REPRESENT A SUBURBAN SCHOOL 5 DISTRICT, EACH APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE, ON THE 6 ADVICE OF A STATEWIDE ASSOCIATION THAT REPRESENTS SCHOOL 7 EXECUTIVES;

8 (C) FOUR SCHOOL PRINCIPALS, OR THEIR RESPECTIVE DESIGNEES, 9 ONE OF WHOM MUST REPRESENT AN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL, APPOINTED BY 10 THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE, ON THE ADVICE OF A STATEWIDE 11 ASSOCIATION THAT REPRESENTS SCHOOL EXECUTIVES; ONE OF WHOM 12 MUST REPRESENT A MIDDLE SCHOOL, APPOINTED BY THE SPEAKER OF THE 13 HOUSE, ON THE ADVICE OF A STATEWIDE ASSOCIATION THAT REPRESENTS 14 SCHOOL EXECUTIVES; ONE OF WHOM MUST REPRESENT A HIGH SCHOOL, 15 APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE, ON THE ADVICE OF A 16 STATEWIDE ASSOCIATION THAT REPRESENTS SCHOOL EXECUTIVES; AND 17 ONE OF WHOM MUST REPRESENT EITHER A DISTRICT CHARTER SCHOOL, AS 18 DEFINED IN SECTION 22-30.5-112.1, OR AN INSTITUTE CHARTER SCHOOL, 19 AS DEFINED IN SECTION 22-30.5-502, APPOINTED BY THE MINORITY 20 LEADER OF THE SENATE, ON THE ADVICE OF A STATEWIDE ASSOCIATION 21 THAT REPRESENTS SCHOOL EXECUTIVES:

(D) THREE TEACHERS, ONE OF WHOM MUST REPRESENT AN URBAN
SCHOOL DISTRICT, APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE, ON THE
Advice of a statewide association that represents educators;
ONE OF WHOM MUST REPRESENT A RURAL SCHOOL DISTRICT, APPOINTED
BY THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE, ON THE ADVICE OF A STATEWIDE
ASSOCIATION THAT REPRESENTS EDUCATORS; AND ONE OF WHOM MUST

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REPRESENT A SUBURBAN SCHOOL DISTRICT, APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT
 OF THE SENATE, ON THE ADVICE OF A STATEWIDE ASSOCIATION THAT
 REPRESENTS EDUCATORS;

4 (E) Two special services providers, as defined in section
5 22-60.5-102, appointed by the speaker of the house, on the advice
6 of a statewide association that represents special services
7 providers;

8 (F) Two school resource officers or similar school 9 Personnel, one of whom must represent a rural school district 10 AND IS APPOINTED BY THE MINORITY LEADER OF THE HOUSE OF 11 REPRESENTATIVES, THE OTHER OF WHOM IS APPOINTED BY THE SPEAKER 12 OF THE HOUSE;

13 (G) A REPRESENTATIVE OF A MUNICIPAL POLICE DEPARTMENT OR
14 A COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE, APPOINTED BY THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE,
15 ON THE ADVICE OF A STATEWIDE ORGANIZATION DEDICATED TO
16 PROTECTING AND SUPPORTING LAW ENFORCEMENT AND PUBLIC SAFETY
17 PERSONNEL;

18 (H) Two professional experts in child development,
19 MENTAL HEALTH, OR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH, ONE OF WHOM IS APPOINTED
20 BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE, ON THE ADVICE OF A MENTAL HEALTH
21 PROFESSIONAL, AND ONE OF WHOM IS APPOINTED BY THE MINORITY
22 LEADER OF THE SENATE, ON THE ADVICE OF A MENTAL HEALTH
23 PROFESSIONAL;

(I) TWO PROFESSIONAL EXPERTS IN SCHOOL SAFETY, ONE OF WHOM
is appointed by the president of the senate and one of whom is
appointed by the speaker of the house;

27 (J) A REPRESENTATIVE OF A STATEWIDE ORGANIZATION THAT

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REPRESENTS STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES, APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT
 OF THE SENATE;

3 (K) A REPRESENTATIVE OF AN EDUCATOR PREPARATION PROGRAM,
4 AS DEFINED IN SECTION 22-60.5-121, APPOINTED BY THE SPEAKER OF THE
5 HOUSE;

6 (L) A REPRESENTATIVE OF AN ALTERNATIVE TEACHER PROGRAM,
7 AS DEFINED IN SECTION 22-60.5-102, APPOINTED BY THE SPEAKER OF THE
8 HOUSE;

9 (M) A REPRESENTATIVE OF AN ORGANIZATION THAT PROVIDES 10 PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SERVICES TO EDUCATORS AND HAS 11 EXPERIENCE IN DEVELOPING AND INCORPORATING TRAUMA-INFORMED 12 PRACTICES, APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE; AND

13 (N) A PROFESSIONAL EXPERT IN NATURAL DISASTER PREPARATION,
14 APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR.

15 (b) THE APPOINTING AUTHORITIES SHALL APPOINT THE MEMBERS
16 OF THE WORK GROUP BY JULY 31, 2025.

17 (c) ANY VACANCY OCCURRING IN THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE WORK
18 GROUP MUST BE FILLED IN THE SAME MANNER AS THE ORIGINAL
19 APPOINTMENT.

20 (d) A MAJORITY OF THE VOTING MEMBERS OF THE WORK GROUP
21 CONSTITUTES A QUORUM FOR THE TRANSACTION OF BUSINESS, AND A
22 MAJORITY OF A QUORUM PRESENT AT ANY MEETING IS SUFFICIENT FOR ANY
23 OFFICIAL ACTION TAKEN BY THE WORK GROUP.

(e) THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE WORK GROUP SHALL CONVENE THE
FIRST MEETING OF THE WORK GROUP NO LATER THAN SEPTEMBER 1, 2025.
THE WORK GROUP SHALL MEET AT LEAST FOUR TIMES IN 2025 AND AT
LEAST THREE TIMES IN 2026. THE WORK GROUP SHALL ESTABLISH

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PROCEDURES TO ALLOW MEMBERS OF THE WORK GROUP TO PARTICIPATE
 IN THE MEETINGS REMOTELY.

3 (f) THE MEMBERS OF THE WORK GROUP SERVE WITHOUT
4 COMPENSATION BUT MAY BE REIMBURSED FOR EXPENSES DIRECTLY
5 RELATING TO THEIR SERVICE ON THE WORK GROUP.

6 (g) UPON THE REQUEST OF THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE WORK
7 GROUP, THE OFFICE SHALL PROVIDE STAFF ASSISTANCE, MEETING SPACE,
8 OR AUDIO-VISUAL COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY RESOURCES TO THE
9 WORK GROUP AS NECESSARY FOR THE PERFORMANCE OF ITS DUTIES.

10

(5) THE WORK GROUP SHALL:

11 (a) IDENTIFY THE INTENDED OUTCOMES OF THE
12 TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES;

13 (b) IDENTIFY BEST PRACTICES FOR INCORPORATING
14 TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES INTO SCHOOL SAFETY DRILLS TO RESPOND
15 TO DIFFERENT TYPES OF SCHOOL SAFETY INCIDENTS;

16 (c) USE THE BEST PRACTICES IDENTIFIED IN SUBSECTION (5)(b) OF
17 THIS SECTION TO DETERMINE HOW TO BEST IMPLEMENT
18 TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES FOR SCHOOLS TO:

19 (I) PLAN AND EXECUTE DIFFERENT TYPES OF SCHOOL SAFETY20 DRILLS;

21 (II) IMMEDIATELY RESPOND TO A SCHOOL SAFETY INCIDENT; AND
22 (III) BEST RESPOND TO STUDENTS WHO HAVE AN EMOTIONAL
23 REACTION AS A RESULT OF SCHOOL SAFETY DRILLS;

(d) DETERMINE THE SKILLS AND KNOWLEDGE NECESSARY TO
TRAIN SCHOOL PERSONNEL TO ADEQUATELY IMPLEMENT AND USE
TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES WHEN CONDUCTING SCHOOL SAFETY
DRILLS;

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(e) DETERMINE THE NECESSARY FREQUENCY OF SCHOOL
 PERSONNEL TRAINING TO ENSURE THE ADEQUATE USE OF
 TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES DURING SCHOOL SAFETY DRILLS;

4 (f) DETERMINE THE NECESSARY FREQUENCY OF SCHOOL SAFETY
5 DRILLS TO ADEQUATELY PREPARE STUDENTS AND SCHOOL PERSONNEL FOR
6 SCHOOL SAFETY INCIDENTS;

7 (g) DETERMINE THE AMOUNT OF ADVANCE NOTICE GIVEN TO
8 PARENTS BEFORE CONDUCTING A SCHOOL SAFETY DRILL;

9 (h) PROVIDE GUIDANCE FOR PARENTS ON TALKING TO STUDENTS
10 ABOUT SCHOOL SAFETY DRILLS;

(i) IDENTIFY STATE AND LOCAL RESOURCES NEEDED TO SUPPORT
 SCHOOLS IN IMPLEMENTING TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES FOR
 CONDUCTING SCHOOL SAFETY DRILLS; AND

(j) IDENTIFY POSSIBLE FUNDING SOURCES TO SUPPORT SCHOOLS IN
 INCORPORATING TRAUMA-INFORMED PRACTICES INTO SCHOOL SAFETY
 DRILLS TO RESPOND TO DIFFERENT TYPES OF SCHOOL SAFETY INCIDENTS.

17 (6) THE WORK GROUP SHALL CREATE A REPORT CONTAINING
18 FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS CREATED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION
19 (5) OF THIS SECTION. THE REPORT MUST ACCOUNT FOR THE DIFFERENT
20 NEEDS OF ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS.

(7) NO LATER THAN JUNE 30, 2026, THE WORK GROUP MUST
SUBMIT A REPORT CONTAINING THE FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS
DEVELOPED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (6) OF THIS SECTION TO THE OFFICE
AND TO THE EDUCATION COMMITTEES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
AND THE SENATE, OR ANY SUCCESSOR COMMITTEES; THE GOVERNOR; THE
STATE BOARD; THE COMMISSIONER OF EDUCATION; AND THE DEPARTMENT
OF EDUCATION.

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SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 24-33.5-2702, 1 2 **amend** (2)(g); and **add** (2)(g.5) as follows: 3 24-33.5-2702. Office of school safety - created - duties - grants 4 **manager - crisis response unit.** (2) The office has the following duties: (g) To administer the youth violence prevention grant program; 5 6 and 7 (g.5)TO OVERSEE THE WORK GROUP CREATED IN SECTION 8 24-33.5-2705; AND 9 Safety clause. The general assembly finds, SECTION 4. determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate 10 11 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety or for appropriations for 12 the support and maintenance of the departments of the state and state 13 institutions.
