A BILL FOR AN ACT CONCERNING INCREASING THE CRIMINAL PENALTY FOR FAILING OR REFUSING TO LEAVE A PREMISES OR PROPERTY UPON REQUEST

Bill Summary

OF A PEACE OFFICER.

The bill increases criminal penalties for failing or refusing to leave a premises or property when requested by a peace officer.

1	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:
2	SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 18-9-119, amend (2),
3	(3), and (4) as follows:
4	18-9-119. Failure or refusal to leave premises or property
5	upon request of a peace officer - penalties - payment of costs. (2) Any
6	A person who barricades or refuses police entry to any premises or
7	property through use of or threatened use of force and who knowingly
8	refuses or fails to leave any premises or property upon being requested to
9	do so by a peace officer who has probable cause to believe a crime is
10	occurring and that such THE person constitutes a danger to himself or
11	herself THEMSELF or others commits a class 2 misdemeanor CLASS 6
12	FELONY.
13	(3) Any A person who violates subsection (2) of this section and
14	who, in the same criminal episode, knowingly holds another person
15	hostage or who confines or detains such THE other person without that
16	person's consent, without proper legal authority, and without the use of
17	a deadly weapon commits a class 1 misdemeanor CLASS 5 FELONY.
18	(4) Any A person who violates subsection (2) or (3) of this section
19	and who, in the same criminal episode, recklessly or knowingly causes a
20	peace officer to believe that he THE PERSON possesses a deadly weapon
21	commits a class 1 misdemeanor CLASS 5 FELONY.
22	SECTION 2. Effective date - applicability. This act takes effect
23	July 1, 2025, and applies to offenses committed on or after said date.
24	SECTION 3. Safety clause. The general assembly finds,
25	determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
26	preservation of the public peace, health, or safety or for appropriations for
