Bill Summary: *"The Bill creates the "In God We Trust" license plate for motor vehicles. In addition to the normal fees for a license plate, a person must pay 2 additional one-time fees of \$25 for the issuance of the plate. One of these fees is credited to the highway users tax fund and the other fee is credited to the Colorado DRIVES vehicle services account."*

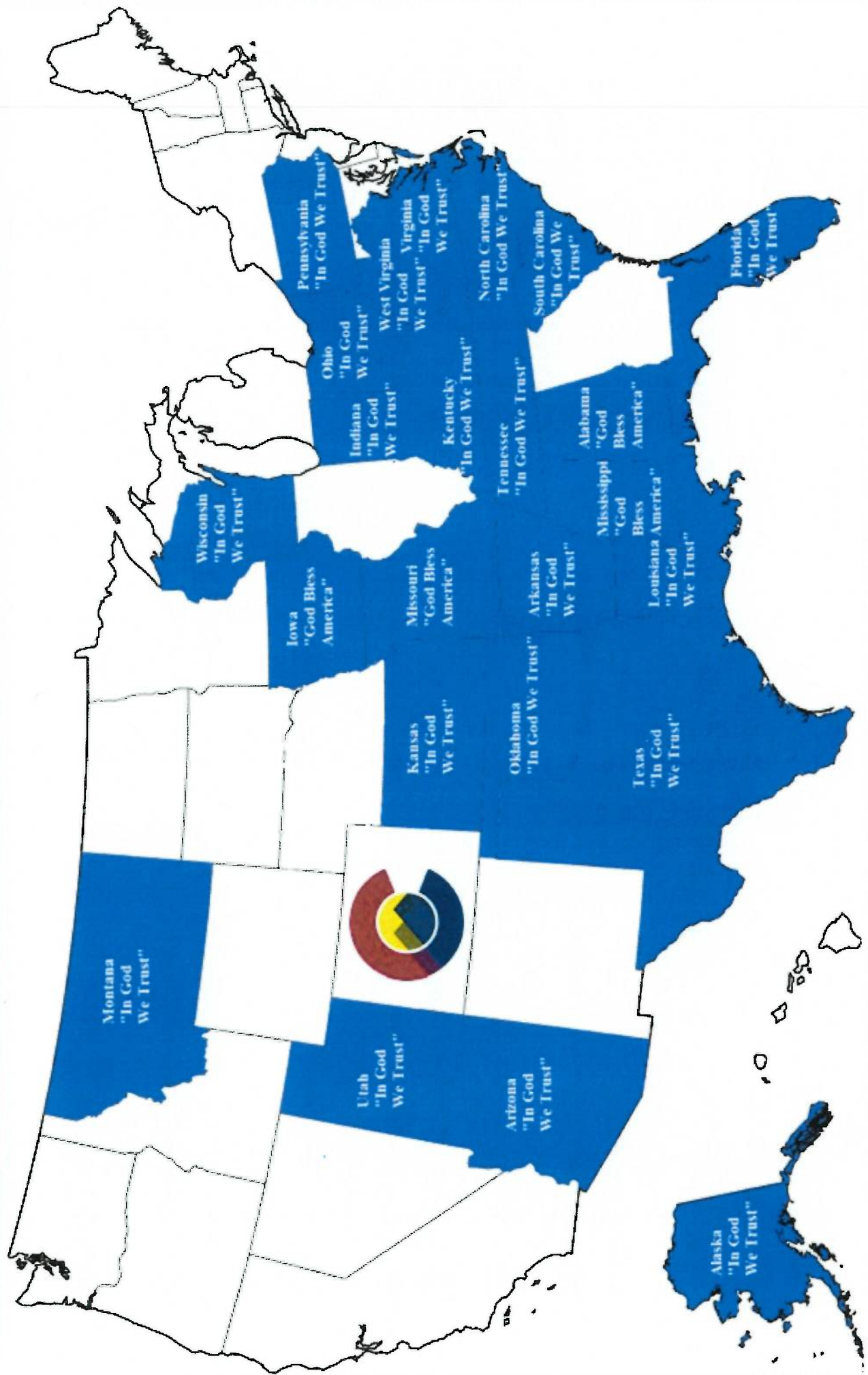

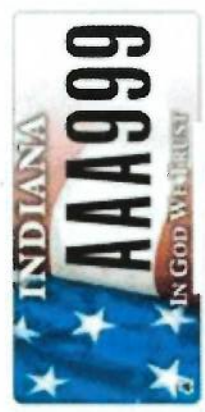
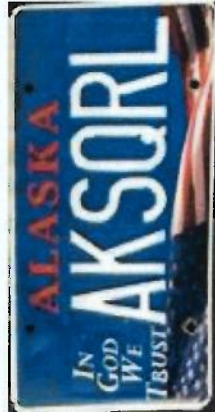

Written Testimony to the Colorado Senate Finance Committee on the occasion of its hearing, February 7, 2023, on SB23-025, the "In God We Trust Special License Plate Bill":

Ladies and Gentlemen of the committee, my name is Jerry D. Owen, I reside at 16025 Quandary Loop, Broomfield, CO 80023. I am a retired commercial airline pilot of twenty years continuous service, retired military fighter-attack-reconnaissance pilot with thirty-two years of combined service in the United States Marine Corps, Air National Guard, and United States Air Force. I have two Masters of Arts degrees, one in Management and Human Relations from Webster University, and one in National Defense Policy and Strategic Studies from the United States Naval War College. I taught history as an associate professor of Naval Science at the University of Colorado for two and a half years. I am also a retired Colorado Licensed Real Estate Broker with twenty-five years of full-time real estate sales and brokerage experience. I am 77 years old, and still charging along in a busy retirement by performing volunteer work for a number of veterans' groups, charitable foundations, and civic organizations.

I write to the committee today to urge the passage of Senate Bill 23-025 which would give Colorado's drivers the option of purchasing license plates displaying the flags of the United States and the State of Colorado, and the motto, "In God We Trust". The rationale for advocating the bill's passage is as follows: In the Declaration of Independence, penned by Thomas Jefferson in 1775 it clearly states that we, the American People, are "...endowed by our Creator with certain unalienable rights" which include "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness". Jefferson, not a religious man per se, but a Deist, nevertheless believed as did a unanimous membership of the First Continental Congress that those precious rights, later codified in the US Constitution of 1789, were recognized by a nearly unanimous majority of delegates to our country's Constitutional Convention to have come from their Creator God, and not from the governments of men. The United States for "twelve score and seven years" has adorned our currency and public buildings with a trinity of our national mottoes, "Liberty", "E Pluribus Unum" (out of many, one), and, I would argue, most importantly, "In God We Trust". These comprise the three-legged plinth of ideals upon which our country has stood through the potentially fatal perils which have faced the Republic. As a commissioned US military officer, I took a solemn oath "to support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic...." sealing that life and death promise with "So help me God".

So, in recognition of the foregoing, I offer my most ardent support for this bill, which would create the option of an "In God We Trust" license plate, because there are many of us Coloradoans who still believe in the founding principles upon which our precious freedoms as Americans are derived, and would like to promote that belief on the license plates adorning our motor vehicles. Rhetorically I raise this question for your consideration as representatives of the people of Colorado: if optional special license plates touting "pet rescue" or the "Colorado Rockies" major league baseball team are currently available to motor vehicle owners, is it really too much to ask that those of us who still believe firmly in our national motto, "In God We Trust" be offered that same option for our own license plates that has been afforded to baseball team boosters, "Pike's Peak Hill Climb" fans, or "Greyhound Lovers"?

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill creates the "In God We Trust" license plate for motor vehicles. In addition to the normal fees for a license plate, a person must pay 2 additional one-time fees of \$25 for the issuance of the plate. One of these fees is credited to the highway users tax fund and the other fee is credited to the Colorado DRIVES vehicle services account.

1 *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

2 **SECTION 1.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **add 42-3-267** as
3 follows:

4 **42-3-267. Special plates - "In God We Trust".** (1) BEGINNING
5 ON JANUARY 1, 2024, OR WHEN THE DEPARTMENT IS ABLE TO ISSUE THE
6 PLATES, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL ISSUE SPECIAL LICENSE PLATES TO
7 QUALIFIED APPLICANTS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THIS SECTION FOR
8 MOTORCYCLES, PASSENGER CARS, TRUCKS, OR NONCOMMERCIAL OR
9 RECREATIONAL MOTOR VEHICLES THAT DO NOT EXCEED SIXTEEN
10 THOUSAND POUNDS EMPTY WEIGHT.

11 (2) (a) THERE IS HEREBY ESTABLISHED THE "IN GOD WE TRUST"
12 LICENSE PLATE.

13 (b) THE DEPARTMENT SHALL DESIGN THE PLATE IN COOPERATION
14 AND CONSULTATION WITH INTERESTED PERSONS TO FEATURE THE
15 STATEMENT "IN GOD WE TRUST".

16 (3) THE AMOUNT OF THE TAXES AND FEES FOR SPECIAL LICENSE
17 PLATES UNDER THIS SECTION IS THE SAME AS THE AMOUNT OF THE TAXES
18 AND FEES FOR REGULAR MOTOR VEHICLE LICENSE PLATES; EXCEPT THAT
19 THE DEPARTMENT SHALL COLLECT AN ADDITIONAL ONE-TIME FEE OF
20 TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS FOR ISSUANCE OR REPLACEMENT OF THE SPECIAL
21 LICENSE PLATE. THE DEPARTMENT SHALL TRANSMIT THE ADDITIONAL
22 ONE-TIME FEE TO THE STATE TREASURER, WHO SHALL CREDIT THE FEE TO
23 THE HIGHWAY USERS TAX FUND CREATED IN SECTION 43-4-201.

24 (4) AN APPLICANT MAY APPLY TO THE DEPARTMENT FOR

12 **SECTION 2.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **amend** 42-3-312 as

17 when the plate was created, PERSONALIZED PLATES ISSUED UNDER
18 SECTION 42-3-211, or special license plates issued ~~pursuant to~~ UNDER
19 sections ~~42-3-211~~ **42-3-212** to 42-3-214, sections 42-3-217 to 42-3-218,
20 sections 42-3-221 to 42-3-234, sections 42-3-237 to 42-3-258, ~~and~~
21 sections 42-3-260 to 42-3-265, AND SECTION 42-3-267 shall pay an
22 issuance fee of twenty-five dollars; except that the fee is not imposed on
23 special license plates exempted from additional fees for the issuance of
24 a military special license plate by section 42-3-213 (1)(b)(II). The
25 department shall transfer the fee to the state treasurer, who shall credit it
26 to the Colorado DRIVES vehicle services account created in section
27 42-1-211 (2).

1 **SECTION 3. Act subject to petition - effective date.** This act
2 takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the
3 ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly; except
4 that, if a referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V
5 of the state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this
6 act within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take
7 effect unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in
8 November 2024 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the
9 official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.

Summary of Legislation

The bill creates the In God We Trust special license plate. By January 1, 2024, the license plate will be available to applicants that pay two one-time fees of \$25, in addition to standard license plate fees.

Assumptions

Expected demand for the plate is based on the actual demand for the Italian American Heritage special license plate.

State Revenue

The bill will increase state cash fund revenue by \$192,469 in FY 2023-24 and \$49,582 in subsequent years, as shown in Table 2. This revenue is subject to TABOR.

Standard license plate fees. Upon registration, all vehicle owners must pay a plate and tab production fee of \$8.06 for a digital passenger vehicle plate set in FY 2023-24 and \$9.81 the following year. All specialty plates are manufactured as digital plates, and the fiscal note assumes motorcycle issuance will be minimal. Fees from plate and tab production are credited to the License Plate Cash Fund (LPCF).

Special license plate fees. Applicants for the In God We Trust special license plate are required to pay an additional \$50 in fees, of which \$25 is credited to the Highway Users Tax Fund (HUTF) and \$25 is credited to the Licensing Services Cash Fund.

Highway Users Tax Fund. Of the HUTF revenue, 65 percent is credited to the State Highway Fund (SHF) for expenditure by the Department of Transportation, 26 percent is credited to counties, and 9 percent is credited to municipalities. Table 3 outlines the estimated HUTF revenue generated under this bill.

State Expenditures

State expenditures in the Department of Revenue (DOR) will increase by \$31,212 in FY 2023-24 and \$8,132 in subsequent years, as shown in Table 4 and detailed below. Expenditures are paid from the General Fund and the License Plate Cash Fund.

Department of Revenue. The DOR will have costs to produce the new plates, perform computer system changes, and make other updates, as outlined below.

- **Plate and tab production.** As discussed in the State Revenue section, plate tab and production costs for special group plates are \$8.06 per license plate set in FY 2023-24 and \$9.81 the following year. Based on the assumed number of plates, this will increase costs by the amounts shown in Table 4 above. In addition, Colorado Correctional Industries will receive a one-time fee of \$200 for designing the plate. Plate and tab production costs are paid from the LPCF.
- **DRIVES programming.** In FY 2023-24, one-time programming costs of \$4,293 are required to update the Driver License, Record, Identification and Vehicle Enterprise Solutions (DRIVES) system with the license plate. Programming costs assume 16 hours at a rate of \$225 per hour for a total cost of \$3,600. Testing can be accomplished within existing appropriations. Office of Information Technology (OIT) support requirements are estimated at 7 hours at a rate of \$99 per hour, which will be allocated to DOR and paid to OIT via real time billing.
- **Training and materials updates.** DOR will be required to update rules, forms, manuals, and the department's website to include the license plate. The DOR will also provide training to authorized agents, Title and Registration Section staff, and law enforcement. Any workload increases or costs associated with these activities can be accomplished within existing appropriations.

Centrally appropriated costs. Pursuant to a Joint Budget Committee policy, certain costs associated with this bill are addressed through the annual budget process and centrally appropriated in the Long Bill or supplemental appropriations bills, rather than in this bill. These costs, which include employee insurance and supplemental employee retirement payments, are shown in Table 2.

Other Budget Impacts

TABOR refunds. The bill is expected to increase the amount of state revenue required to be refunded to taxpayers by the amounts shown in the State Revenue section above. This estimate assumes the December 2022 LCS revenue forecast. A forecast of state revenue subject to TABOR is not available beyond FY 2024-25. Because TABOR refunds are paid from the General Fund, increased cash fund revenue will reduce the amount of General Fund available to spend or save.

General Fund reserve. Under current law, an amount equal to 15 percent of General Fund appropriations must be set aside in the General Fund statutory reserve. Based on this fiscal note, the bill is expected to increase the amount of General Fund held in reserve by \$644 in FY 2023-24, which will decrease the amount of General Fund available for other purposes.

Local Government

This bill will increase local government HUTF revenue by the amounts shown in Table 3. HUTF revenue generated by license plate fees is distributed to counties (26 percent) and municipalities (9 percent) for transportation needs.

Effective Date

The bill takes effect 90 days following adjournment of the General Assembly sine die, assuming no referendum petition is filed.

State Appropriations

For FY 2023-24, the bill requires appropriations of \$31,212 to the Department of Revenue. Of this total:

- \$4,293 is from the General Fund; and,
- \$26,919 is from the License Plate Cash Fund.
