# Youth Connections/Wendy's Wonderful Kids

Youth without permanent placements and most likely to age out of foster care:

- 9 years old and older
- Complex backgrounds, high levels of trauma
- Over 70% have learning differences and/or mental or physical disability
- Children of color
- Identify as LGBTQ+



# **Aging Out - Grim Statistics**

- 1 in 5 youth who age out of foster care will be homeless after age 18.
- Only 50% will be employed at age 24.
- Less than 3% will earn a college degree.
- 70% of former female foster youth will be pregnant by age 21.
- 1 in 4 youth will experience PTSD, equal to or higher than U.S. military veterans.
- \$300k per youth who age out in costs to society *Statistics from the Jim Casey Youth Opportunities Initiative*



# There Is A Solution!

- A rigorous, five-year Child Trends evaluation of WWK confirmed:
  - Children are **1.7 times** more likely to be adopted
  - Older youth are **3 times** more likely to be adopted
  - Those with mental health needs are more than
    3 times more likely to be adopted

# The Missing Middle

- At least 400 youth are in Colorado's child welfare system that are neither high acuity nor placed with kin
- These youth deserve targeted efforts to find permanent connections





# Services to Our Most Vulnerable Are At Risk

- July 1, 2024, state's investment will cease, jeopardizing the public private partnership currently serving 120 youth
- For every dollar the state currently invests (\$340,000/year), youth in foster care benefit by more than 4 times that amount (\$1.5 M annually)
- <u>Current partnerships:</u>

CDHS	23%
Counties	35%
Raise the Future	17%
Dave Thomas Foundation	25%

# **Caregivers need support!**


- Public/private success county, state, and philanthropic funds braided together to intervene early to prevent entry and reentry.
- Trust-Based Relational Intervention (TBRI®) provides tools and support to parent children who come from hard places. This is particularly true for children/youth who have found a permanent home through adoption or guardianship.



## How Can Colorado Lawmakers Help?

#### Youth Connections Program Wendy's Wonderful Kids Model

- Maintain the state, county, private philanthropic partnership
- Modest state investment, <u>\$340,000</u>, leads to big returns for Colorado and vulnerable youth
