Challenges facing the AAPI community due to COVID-19

Services Provided and Challenges

- Remote or in-person services due to COVID-19
 - Culturally it is more acceptable and familiar with building in-person relationships
 - Location of the office was meant to give the community easy access
 - Barriers due language and culture, also the lack of access to technology
 - Lower number of referrals due to the minority myth and also cultural beliefs
 of "not bothering others and take care of problem ourselves" & "saving face"
- Lack of employment and closed-downs for small business
 - Many community members worked in the food service and labor-intensive industry
 - No options of working remotely
 - Lack of income brings on financial and psychological burden to families

The New Normal

- Continue encouraging community to utilize technology as much as they can
- Meet clients/students in-person when necessary, with proper protection for both staffs and clients/students
- Being aware of staff burnout
- Bringing hope and continue to serve the community
