




Colorado Water Trust

- Colorado non-profit created in 2001 to complement the work of State's ISF Program and to restore flows to rivers in need
- Use voluntary, market-based efforts to accomplish our mission
- Our work is transactional; small staff, no advocacy
- Work within existing water law framework and partner with the Colorado Water Conservation Board for ISF use
- Only non-profit organization solely dedicated to restoring flows to Colorado's rivers in need using market-based transactions

All of our projects are <u>VOLUNTARY</u> many are <u>TEMPORARY</u> and our projects can provide <u>COMPENSATION</u>

2012 - 2013

- First-ever use of the *Temporary Instream Flow Loan* statute authorized in 2003
- Partnered with CWCB to secure 7 Temporary ISF Loans
- Developed split season ag/ISF leases

2015 – First-ever approval of a *Water Conservation Program* under new 2013 statute






- Flow restoration tools require partnership with Colorado Water Conservation Board for ISF use to protect flows in rivers
- Developed jointly with CWCB to enhance their existing voluntary water acquisition process and to achieve following goals:

- To invite voluntary water offers from willing water rights owners to benefit streamflows
- To provide a user-friendly mechanism for water rights owners to explore working with CWCB and the Colorado Water Trust on water transactions
- To streamline transaction processes and utilization of resources
- To facilitate implementation of Colorado's Water Plan objectives
- To add flows to river segments in need while coordinating with agricultural and other uses



- Creates a common entry point for water right owners interested in exploring optional, flexible uses for their water rights
- Offers a free, confidential water right review by Water Trust staff to identify whether offered rights can bring meaningful benefits to a stream reach
- Establishes a timeframe to submit inquiries to the Water Trust (by 4/30), and for the Water Trust to respond (by 7/31)



Submitting an inquiry or preliminary offer of water DOES NOT commit water right owners to completing a project with the Water Trust or Water Conservation Board.



Flow Restoration Tools

These tools can provide opportunities for water right owners to use their rights to sustain streams and fisheries during low flows.

Water Conservation Programs

No ISF Protection, but may provide flow benefits depending on location of downstream rights.

Flow Restoration Tools

All tools provide protections for water right owner against diminishment or abandonment of the water right

All tools provide opportunities to share water – can be full or split season use

All tools are flexible – owners have discretion over the terms and timing of use

May provide compensation to the owner for implementation years

Water Conservation Programs

Section 37-92-305(c), CRS (2017)

- SB13-19 originally passed in 2013 in response to 2012 drought; expanded to most Water Divisions in 2017 (HB17-1233)
- Recognized that some water appropriators "may wish to reduce their water consumption, in part to ameliorate the effects of drought on low stream flows, but there is a disincentive in current law that penalizes

appropriators who decrease their consumptive use of water"


Provided "safe harbor" for those owners when they participate in authorized Water **Conservation Programs**



Water Conservation Programs

Section 37-92-305(c), CRS (2017)

- Voluntary reduction in use or non-use of water right for up to 5 years in any consecutive 10-year period
- Available in Water Divisions 1-6 (Not Div 7)
- Can be approved by water providers, state agencies and other entities as authorized by the statute -- no Water Court approval
- No instream protection for water, but possible flow benefits if used in the right place



Protections for owner against abandonment or HCU reduction for implementation years

Water Conservation Program Example



Rio Colorado, Willow Creek


- First approved Water Conservation Program in CO
- Water Conservation Program approved by the Colorado River District
- Owner voluntarily ceases diversion when streamflow drops to 7 cfs; no penalty for not diverting
- Restores flow to 4.8 miles of Willow Creek to its confluence with the Colorado River
- 638 acre-feet restored in 2016



Temporary Loans / Leases of Water for ISF Use

Section 37-83-105, C.R.S (HB 03-1320, HB 07-1012).

- Allows water right owners to temporarily loan their water right to CWCB for ISF use
- Can be used up to 3 years in a 10 year period; for up to 120 days in a calendar year; non-renewable
- Can be used on any stream where CWCB already holds a decreed ISF right
- Amount used by CWCB cannot exceed the amount decreed to the underlying ISF right
- Administrative approval by DWR within 20 days



Protections for owner against abandonment or HCU reduction in years when used for ISF

Temporary ISF Loan Example

Coats Bros Ditch, Tomichi Creek


- Maintain agricultural use (165 acres of irrigated hay and pasture) while providing water to restore flow to Tomichi Creek
- 3/10 Temporary, Split Season Lease.
 Irrigation through July 1 or August 1, followed by ISF use
- Water Trust, CWCB identify annual need for water – owner decides annual and seasonal implementation
- Approved in 2015, first implemented in July 2018, can restore up to 1.85 cfs







Temporary ISF Loan Example




Stagecoach Reservoir, Yampa River

- First ever use of short-term instream flow lease, 2012 drought
- Water Trust purchased storage water from Upper Yampa WCD
- Up to 26 cfs released; lowered water temps in town and allowed Yampa to reopen to recreational use for July 4th holiday
- Subsequent, non-consumptive municipal use by Steamboat and for industrial use by Tri-State
- 3-in-10 years, and used 2012, 2013, 2017




Re-Cap of 2018 Pilot Process

- 25 water rights offered by 21 separate entities Individuals, state/federal government, corporations/large ditch companies
- Offers received from 5 Water Divisions (nothing from D2, D3)
- Decreed uses mostly ag water, some industrial use, some municipal use and some augmentation water



- 9 water rights not good fit
- 15 water rights additional investigations
- 1 project implemented Water
 Conservation Program
 approved by River District

Re-Cap of 2018 Pilot Process



- Severity of the drought added a layer of complexity to the process this year
- Some streams simply had no water
- Some limitations in the tools due to geography or location of ISF water rights
