#### **ESSER Funds**



#### Overall Purpose of All ESSER Funds

To address the impact that COVID-19 has had on education

#### **Priorities of Each ESSER Funding Stream**

- CARES Act: ESSER I Crisis Response
  - To provide schools, staff and students with the *technology and infrastructure to accommodate remote learning environments* caused by COVID-19.
- CRRS Act: ESSER II Resuming/Sustaining In-Person Instruction
  - To provide schools staff and students with the resources and equipment to *safely* return to in-person learning environments for students.
- ARP Act: ESSER III Recovery
  - To support schools, educators and students with resources and programming that address learning loss caused by COVID 19 and remote learning environments.

- Funds must be spent by
   September 30, 2023

## **ESSER III:**~\$1B 90% Allocation\*



 Final application due March 24, 2022

May 23, 2021

Funds must be spent by
 September 30, 2024

\*At least 20% of ESSER III funding must be used to address the learning impacts of COVID-19 through interventions, summer programming, and after-school opportunities

## Allocations





#### Allocation Methodology



- Per Federal statute, the allocation of all **ESSER funds** followed the formula of allocation for Title I funds.
  - Districts that received little or no funding based upon the Title I allocation received distributions from ESSER state set-aside funds
- Coronavirus Relief Funds were distributed on a per-pupil basis that utilized factors from the school finance formula



#### Total Allocations Snapshot



- Colorado school districts have received \$2.17 billion from the <u>formula</u> <u>allocations</u> of Federal COVID recovery funds (CRF & ESSER) to be spent for allowable uses between March 2020 and September 2024
  - To put that in perspective, the total school finance (local and state share) allocation for 2021-2022 is projected to be \$7.99 billion
- Total ESSER & CRF formula allocations range from:

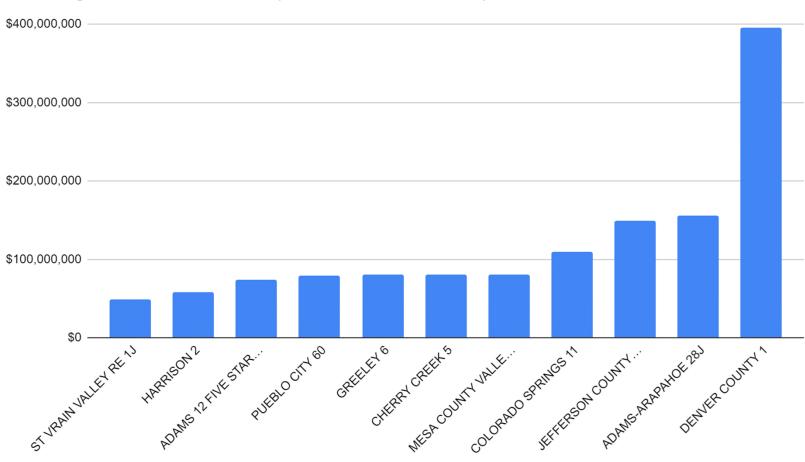
\$113,138 to Kim School District (50 funded pupils) \$395,482,816 to Denver Public Schools (89,785 funded pupils)

The average district CRF & ESSER total allocation is \$12.13 million

All ESSER funds may be used for activities allowable under ESEA, IDEA, the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act, the Perkins CTE Act, or the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, in response to COVID-19.



#### Common Uses of ESSER Funds in Colorado

Purchasing educational technology for students and staff, including both software and hardware

Remote learning supports including electronic media curriculum

Preparedness and response activities and supplies, including PPE and sanitation

Repairing/improving school facilities to reduce health hazards including air-filtration and ventilation

Mental health supports for students, including counselors

Instructional support to counter learning loss, including curriculum purchases and intervention; tutoring; and intervention staff

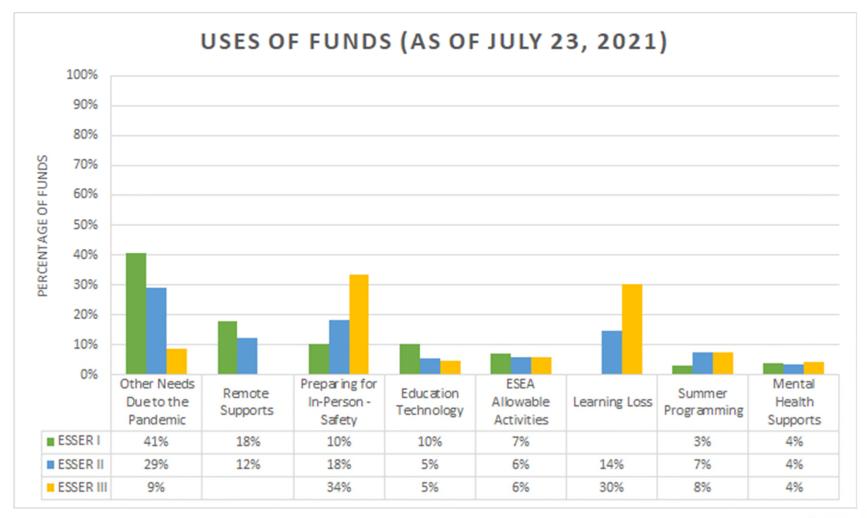
Summer learning and supplemental after-school programs

Augmenting staff salaries including extra duty pay or stipends for supplemental instructional time

Other activities to maintain the operation and continuity of services including hazard pay for teaching in-person and salaries to maintain staff

#### ESSER III State Set-Aside Input Process

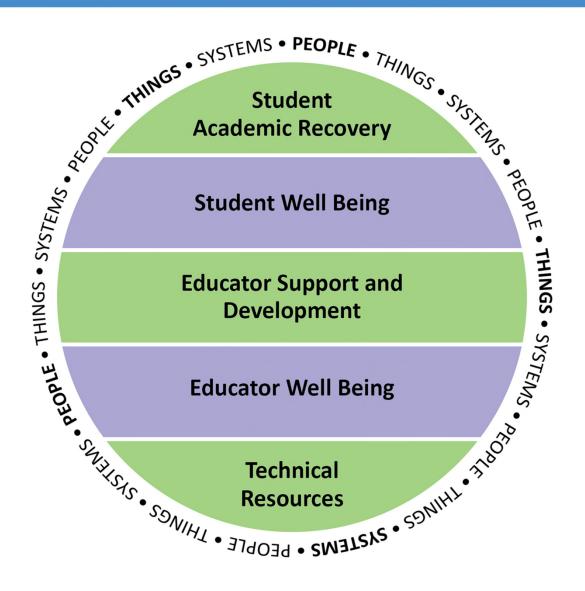
### CDE contracted with Keystone Policy Group to conduct a community input process
