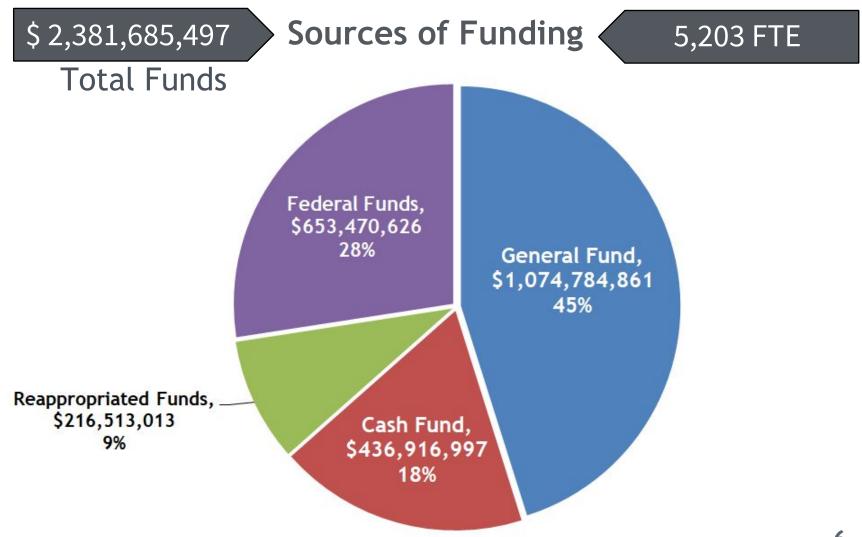

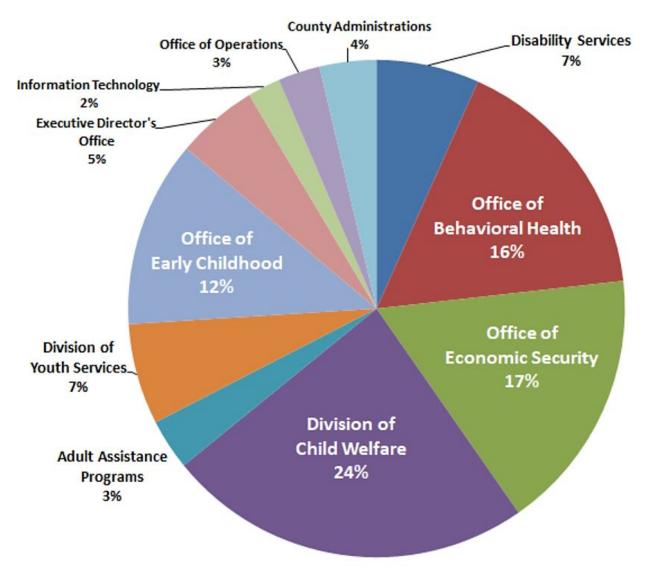


FY 2020-21 Proposed Budget Allocation

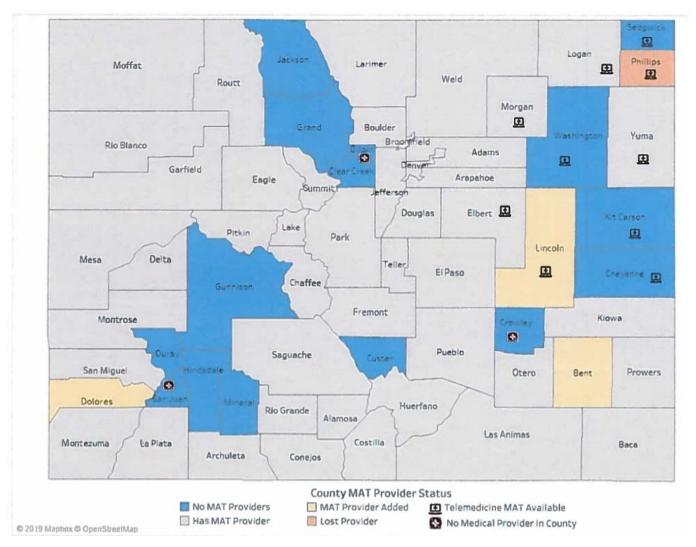

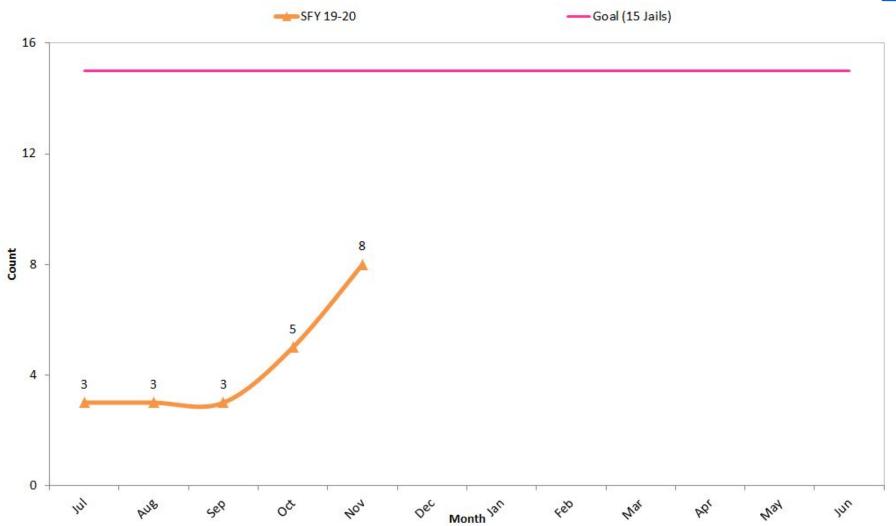
MAT Provider Availability by County

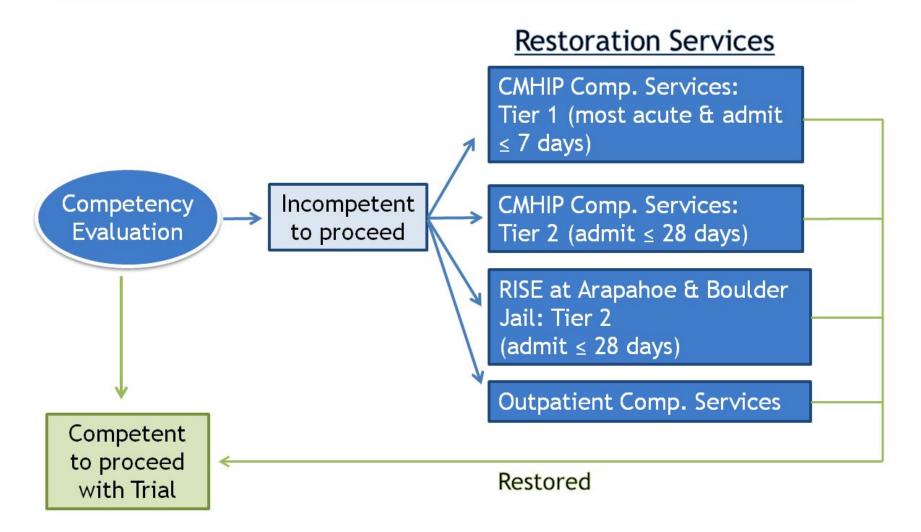

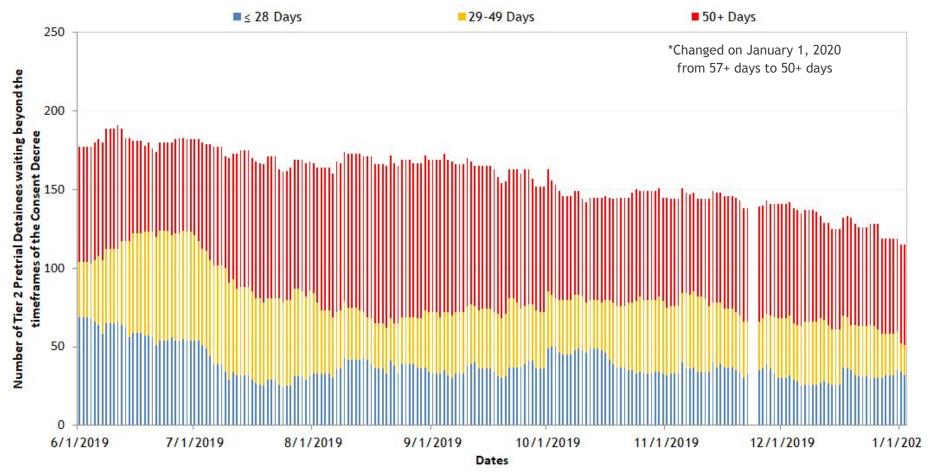

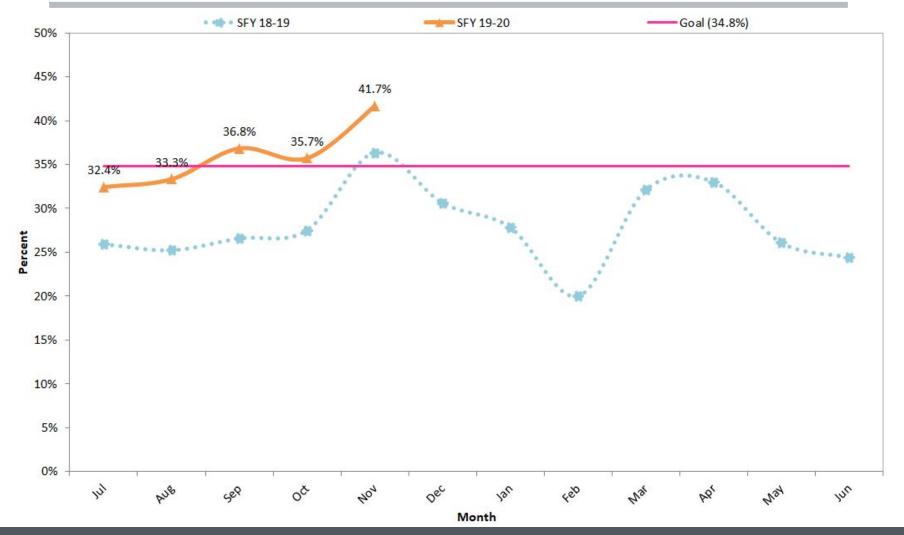
Definition of Tier 1: Pretrial Detainee who meets criteria for a inpatient mental health hold.

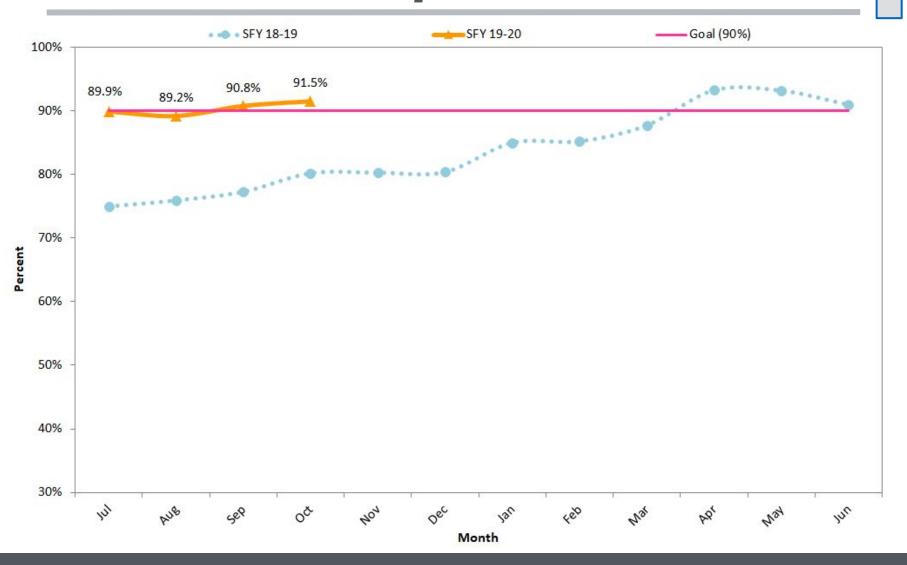

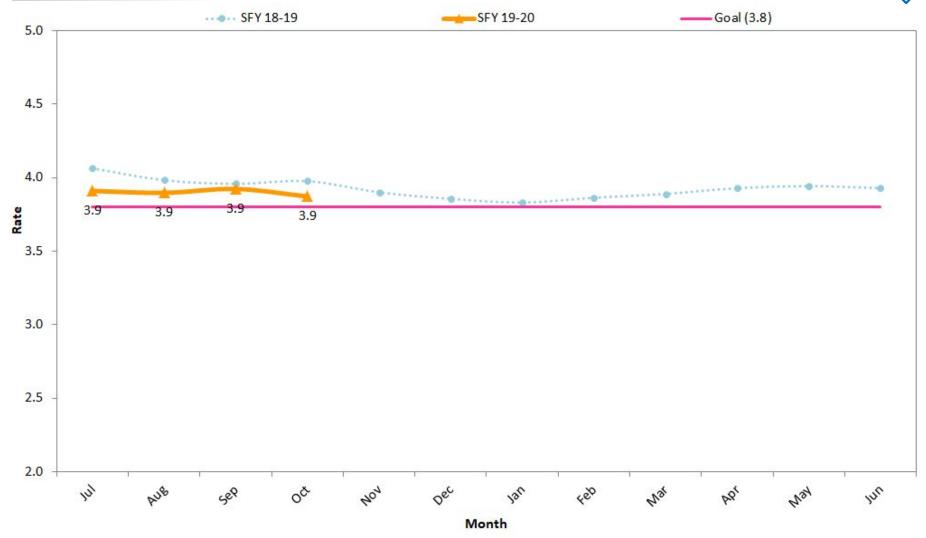

Average Daily Out-of-Home Population per 1,000

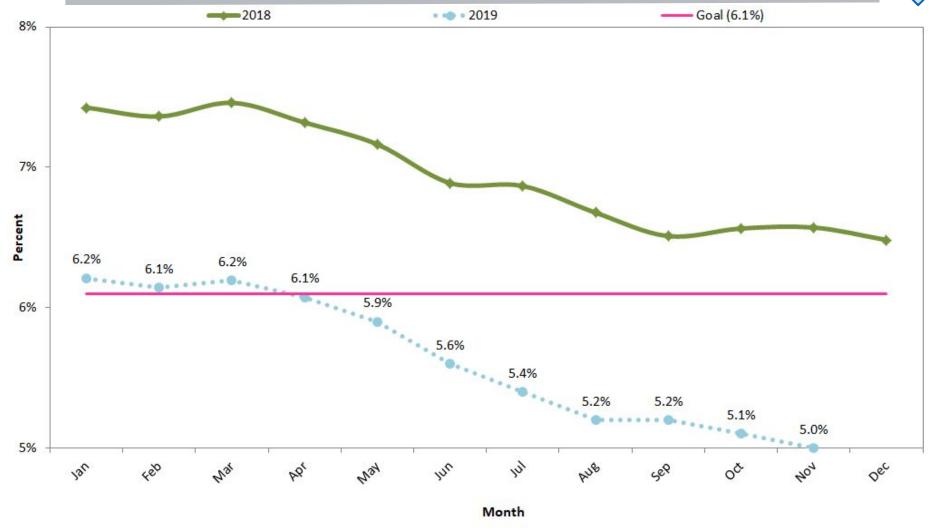

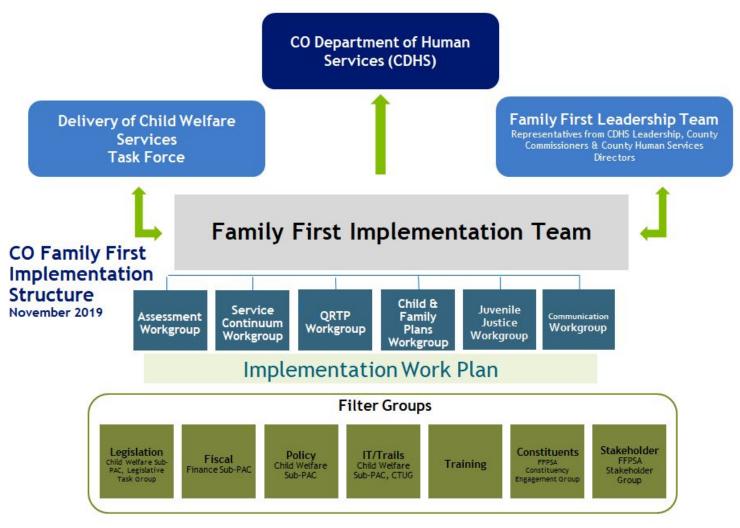






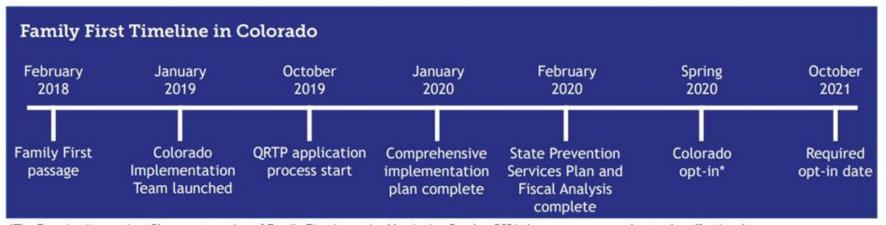


Implementation Structure





Family First Timeline



^{*}The Ensuring Appropriate Placement portion of Family First is required beginning October 2021, but states can accelerate the effective date.

State and tribal Title IV-E agencies were able to "Opt In" to the Title IV-E Prevention Program as early as October 1, 2019, provided they also implement the new requirements on federal reimbursement for non-family settings as specified in Family First. Title IV-E agencies may elect to start operating the Title IV-E Prevention Program at a later date, but they must implement the new rules for eligible non-family settings no later than October 1, 2021.

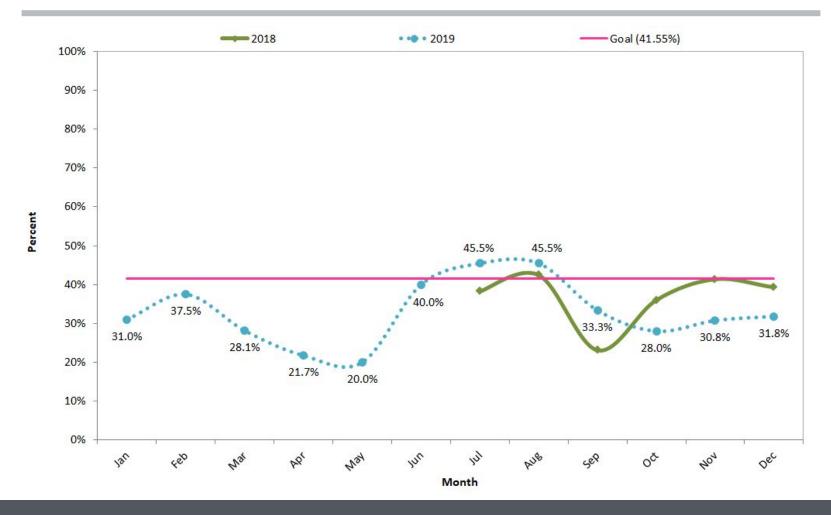

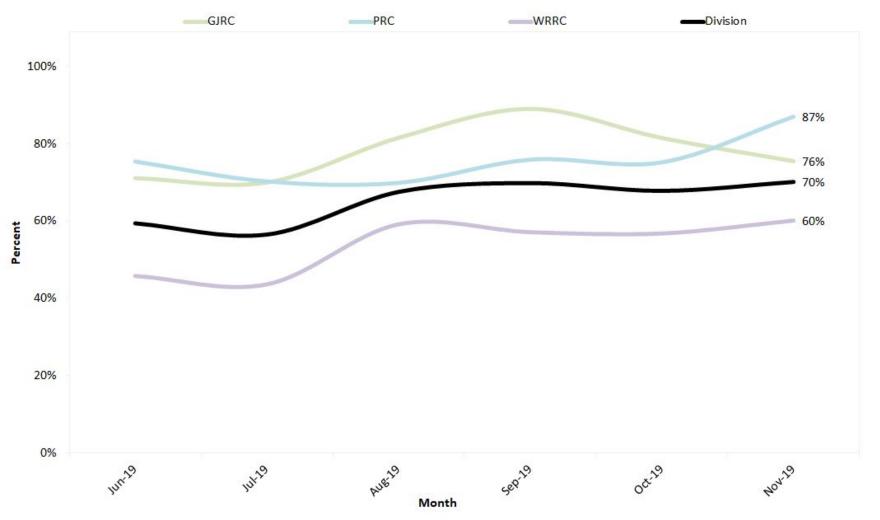

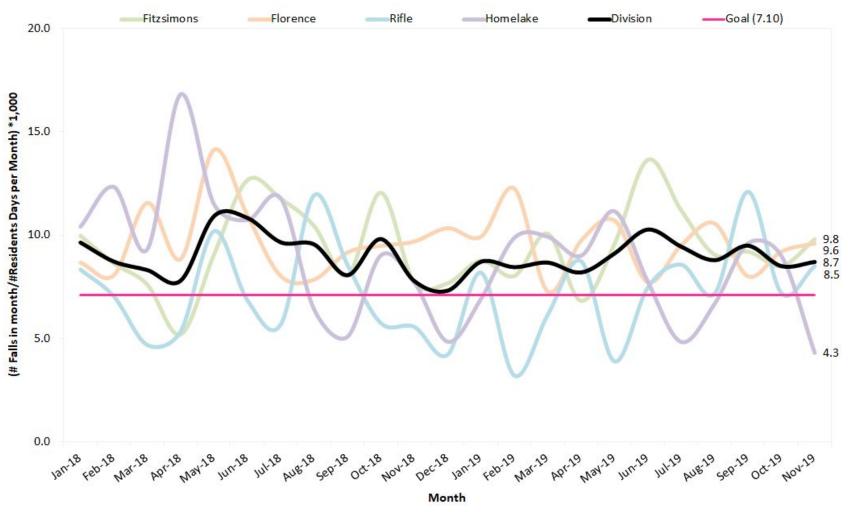

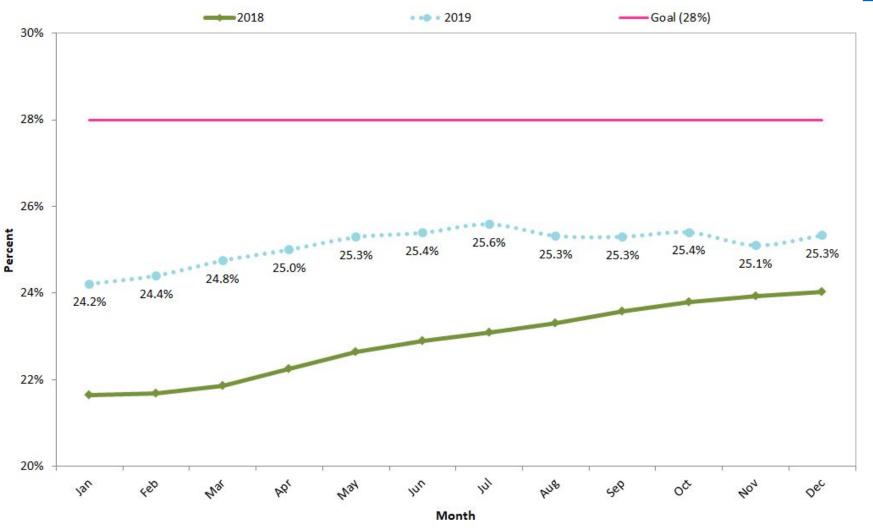

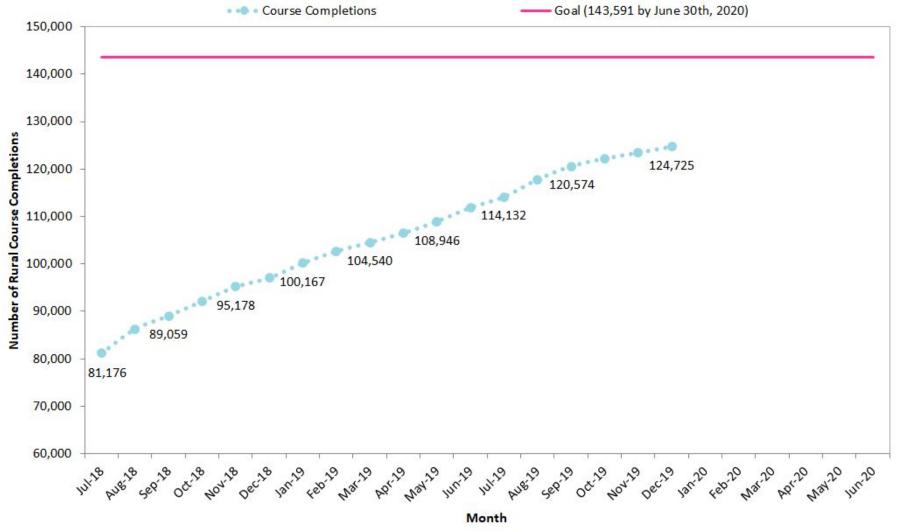

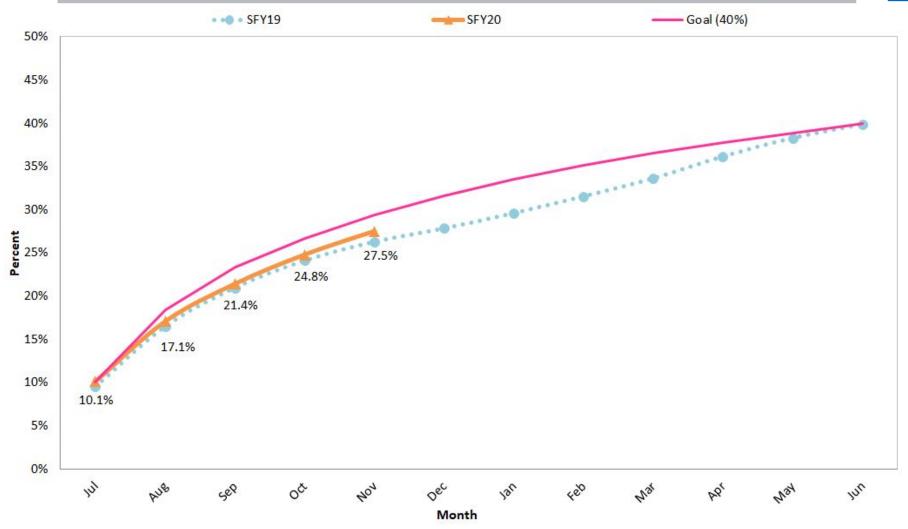

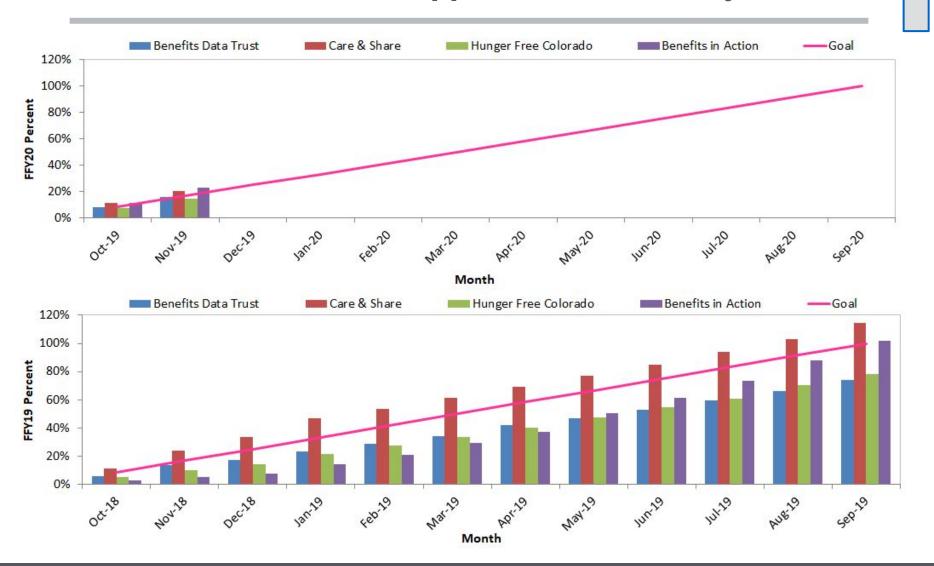
Colorado Works Entered Employment







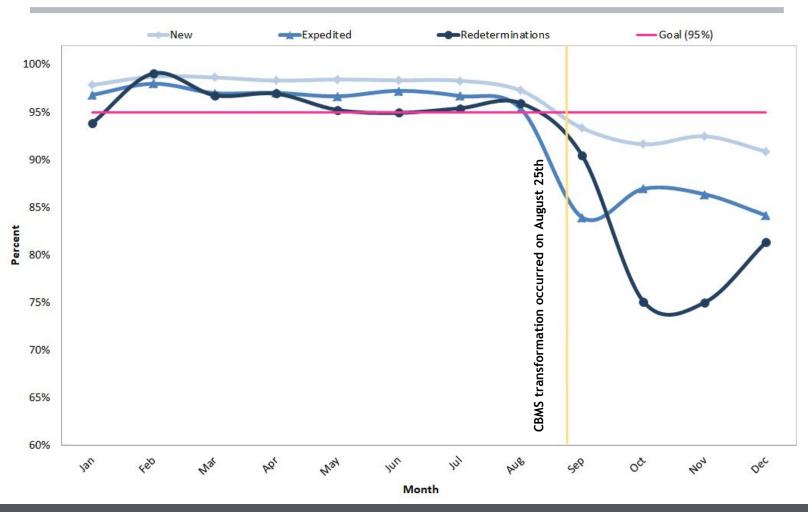
Outreach Partner SNAP Application Volume by Provider 4
