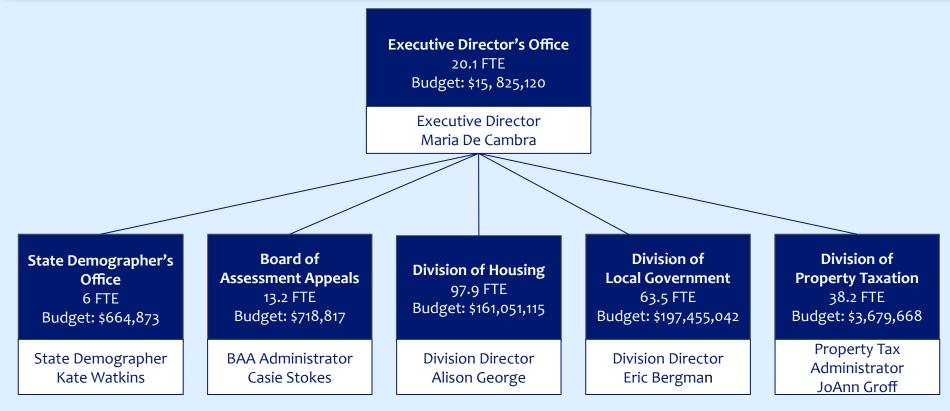

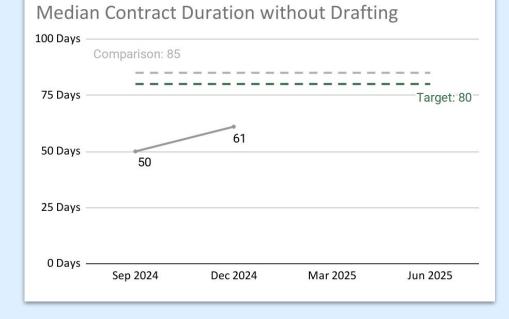

WIG 1: Efficiently Process Housing Contracts



- Initial drafts of contracts are sent to the borrower within a median of 25 days of the award
- Final signature is executed by the State within a median of **7 days** of borrower's final signature
- Documents are executed within a median of 80 days by June 30, 2025 (without drafting time)

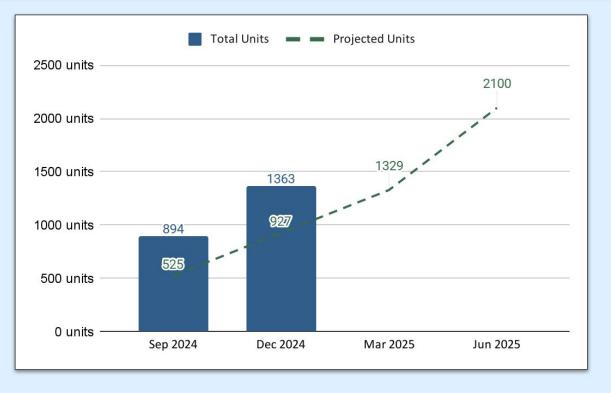
WIG 2: Create 6,300 Housing Opportunities

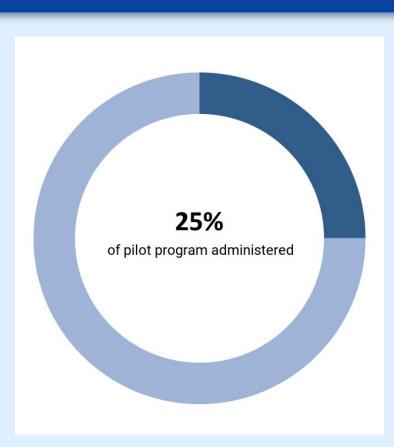


WIG 3: Division of Property Taxation Assistance to Seniors

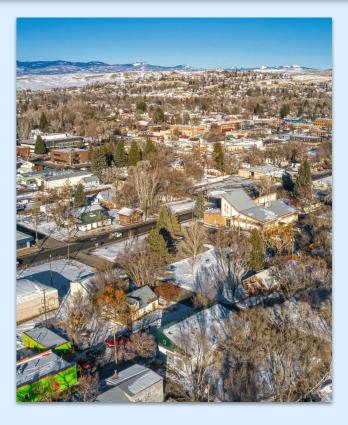

DOLA FY 2025-2026 Budget Requests (Slide 1 of 2)



Request	Amount	Description of Proposal or Request
Ridge View Operating	\$2,000,000 GF	Operating funds for the Ridge View campus in FY 2025 /26. Additional funding required in FY 2026/27+
BAA Backlog Prevention	\$150,000 CF	Additional spending authority of \$150,000 to allow for future cost increases related to staff and indirects.
Advancing Analytics to Support Unhoused Coloradans	\$267,816 GF	Technology upgrades to Colorado Homelessness Management Information System (HMIS) and added staffing capacity will support the collection, analysis, and implementation of information essential to better understand homelessness in Colorado.
Defense Counsel on First Appearance Grant Program Reduction	-\$392,159 GF	A one-time reduction from the General Fund for the DCFA Grant Program, which provides grants to Colorado municipal courts for defense counsel costs at defendants' first appearances.
Severance Tax Refinance	-\$10,000,000 CF	Transfer from the Local Government Severance Tax Fund to the General Fund to support statewide spending priorities.

DOLA FY 2025-2026 Budget Requests (Slide 2 of 2)



Request	Amount	Description of Proposal or Request
Accounting and Human Resource Staffing	\$214,743 GF	New staff to support service delivery that manage the increase in expectations, major shifts in internal program administration, and influx of dollars.
Building Codes and Mobile Home Park Dispute Cash Funds	\$752,000 GF	Intervention for three cash funds to address either negative projected balances or excess uncommitted reserves.
Repeal of FLEX Program	-\$305,016 GF	The FLEX program has not been able to actively enroll any households. DOLA offers this program as a reduction to support statewide priorities.
Decentralize Ft. Lyon Heating	\$15-35M GF	Upgrading heating at Fort Lyon by decentralizing hot water boilers in five main buildings. Current central steam system is inefficient and costly.

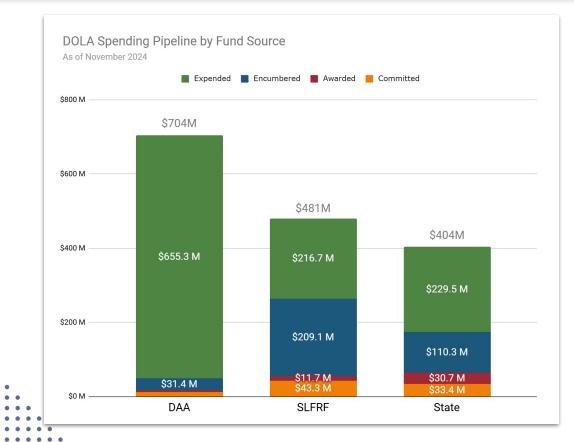

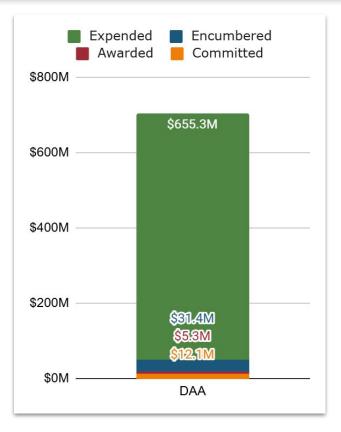

State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (DAA)





Direct Assistance Spending as of November 2024

The department has spent **\$76.9 million** in DAA funding since December 2023. Only **\$12.1 million** remains unawarded – less than **2**% of the department's **\$704 million** DAA allocation.

The remaining DAA funds include:

- **\$10,252,366** Homelessness Assistance and Supportive Services Program
- \$1,854,392 Emergency Housing Vouchers

State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF)





SLFRF Spending as of November 2024

The department has spent **\$197 million** in SLFRF funding since December 2023. Only **\$43.3 million** remains unawarded, which is **9**% of the department's **\$480 million** SLFRF allocation.

The majority of the remaining SLFRF funds include:

- **\$29,887,751** Repurposed Ridgeview Campus
- **\$4,639,256** Denver-Metro Regional Navigation Campus Grant
- \$3,213,777 Homelessness Response Grant Program

State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (State)





since December 2023. Only **\$33.4 million** remains unawarded, which is 8% of the department's \$403.8 million

The remaining State funds include

- **\$26,790,009** Affordable Housing Revolving Loan
- \$5,423,890 Mobile Home Park Resident **Empowerment Loan and Grant Program Fund**
- **\$1,155,467** Housing Development Grants Hotels Tenancy Support Program

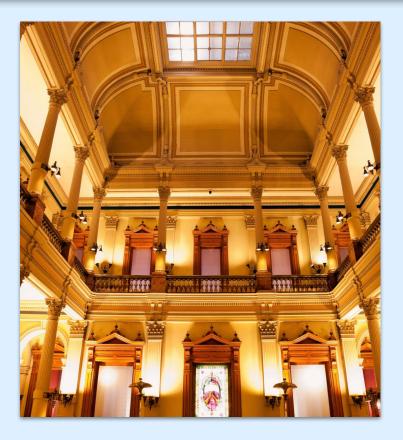

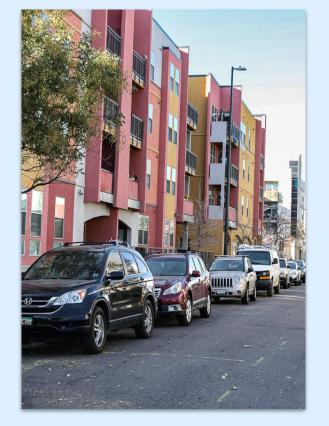

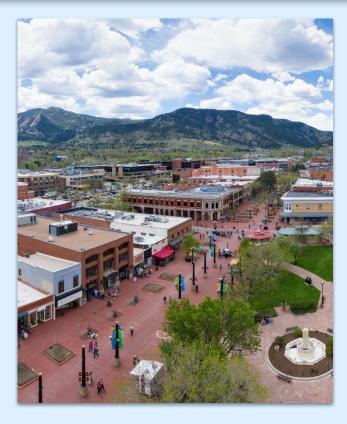

HB19-1309 Mobile Home Park Oversight Program



- DOLA Division of Housing's <u>Mobile Home Park</u>
 <u>Oversight Program (MHPOP</u>) is committed to ensuring that the rights and responsibilities of both mobile home residents and landlords are upheld as a neutral party.
- The Program focuses on providing **oversight**, education, and resources to ensure compliance with state laws and support fair interactions between residents and park owners.
 - Oversees 750+ mobile home parks

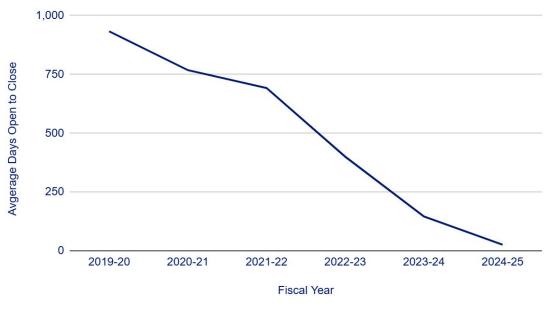

Mobile Home Park Oversight Program: Success Story





MHPOP **prioritizes complaints** by the level of significance of the complaint, with a **focus on public health and safety**.



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Annual Affordable Housing





5,609 housing units preserved or produced with funds through the Division of Housing

- For every **one dollar** of state or federal funds, **\$7.33 leveraged**
- Division of Housing funds **12**% of capital stack

Housing development and preservation revenues and expenditures, State Fiscal Year 2023-24

- **\$54,475,894** appropriated, allocated, or transferred to the Division of Housing
- \$308,115,711 awarded by the Division of Housing to grantees and borrowers

Affordable Housing: Grants and Loans





In FY24:

- Affordable Housing Grants:
 - DOH funded 4,329 new housing units and rehabbed 726 more.
- Homelessness Grants
 - DOH provided housing for **833 individuals** experiencing homelessness.
- Affordable Housing Revolving Loan
 - **Over \$133.8 million was awarded** for affordable housing preservation and production
- Mobile Home Park Revolving Loan
 - DOH provided **\$28.75 million** to help residents purchase and manage their mobile home parks.

DOLA's Emergency Rental Assistance



For many Coloradans, rental assistance is not just a lifeline — it's a beacon of hope.

- Since 2021, we have served over **49,000 households**, across all **64 counties** in Colorado.
- **Currently,** on average DOLA is assisting **approximately 140 cases a week**, totaling a payout of **\$910,000** per week.
- Demand:
 - Households in need per month: 1,341
 - Households in need per year: 16,092
- The program is open to all eligible Coloradans and those facing eviction will continue to be prioritized

Ridge View: Approach





A Comprehensive Approach to Housing Stability and Community Integration

Goal is for residents to:

- Recover from homelessness and substance use disorders
- Find long-term housing stability
- Reintegrate into their community of choice

225

Transitional housing:

- 225 beds
- 9 month average stay
- Serves average of 300 individuals/year

27

Withdrawal Management & Clinic:

- 27 beds
- 14 day average stay
- Serves average of 700 individuals/year

Ridge View: Anticipated Impact





\$45K/year in Colorado for someone to live on the streets (**\$67K nationally**)



Cost at Ridge View per year: \$20K/person for transitional housing



\$**7,500**/person for treatment / withdrawal clinic

Colorado saves **\$17,500/person** if an individual is cared for at Ridge View

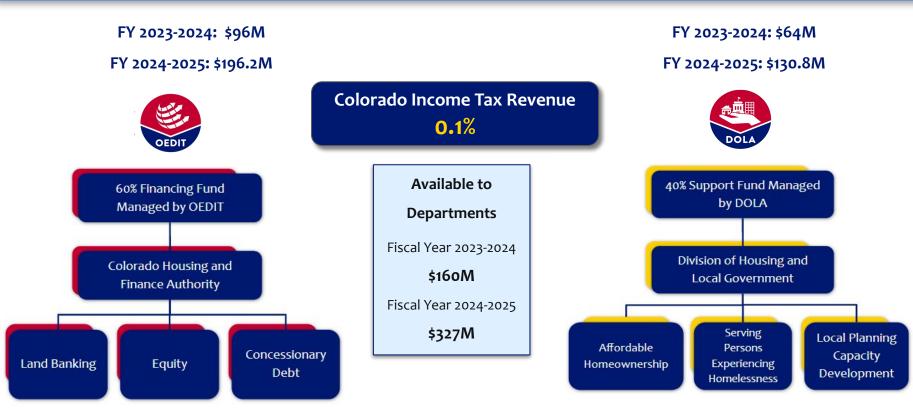
