Re: SB 20-003, State Parks Funding Enhancements

Dear Honorable House Speaker Becker, Senate President Garcia, Representatives Esgar and Will and Senator Hisey,

Las Animas County Commissioners and the City of Trinidad are aware of the unprecedented economic impact of the Coronavirus pandemic on the entire state and the enormous task the Joint Budget Committee has undertaken since May 4th to balance the state budget while cutting over \$3.3 billion from current programs. The impact of the program cuts will result in reduced levels of services provided to citizens at the local level in areas such as mental health, education, and prevention services.

Although funding for state parks enhancements and development of the land for the newest state park surrounding Fishers Peak is in jeopardy, the County and City continue to request this general fund support to help jumpstart the economy of southern Colorado and the City of Trinidad and Las Animas County. The last recession in 2009-10 resulted in the shutdown of mines in Las Animas County and the layoff of workers which resulted in an exodus of people leaving the region and it took several years for the City and County to recover.

With the recent infusion of capital that has increased the commercial activity and tourism, the City and County believe that opening the newest state park will stimulate the economy.

Trinidad State Junior College is planning to initiate a trail building program that will be the first of its kind in the nation and many of the classes will take place onsite at Fishers Peak. This program represents up to \$21,000 in tuition payments and is expected to generate about \$50,000 into the local economy through food, lodging and other incidentals. If the opening is delayed, it will mean lost revenue for the college and community.

This is critical due to the projected revenue losses that the City and County will be faced with in addressing budget shortfalls in calendar years 2020 and 2021. The City of Trinidad is projecting a minimum revenue loss of 22% to 30% in 2020 that includes a 24% reduction in sales tax revenue due to the closure of businesses and tourism, a 30% reduction in marijuana revenue and revenue reductions due to the closure of recreation facilities, municipal fees, etc. Las Animas County is projecting a total shortfall of \$2.95 million in 2020 and 2021 that includes reduced revenue in the following areas: oil and gas, property taxes, planning, fairground rentals, HUTF, energy impact grants, mineral lease rights, etc.

In addition, drought conditions are affecting the southeastern part of Colorado and the COVID-19 pandemic has affected the agricultural sector which may force ranchers out of business.

Therefore, we request that the General Assembly consider approving any general fund investment the state's budget is able to bear to develop park infrastructure for Fishers Peak State Park that will help stimulate the long-term economic recovery for the region and allow citizens to start enjoying the amenities the Park and region offer.

The City of Trinidad and Las Animas County greatly appreciate your consideration.

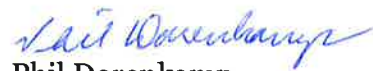

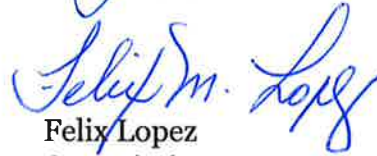

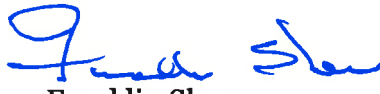

Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) respectfully requests your concurrence on a land acquisition in Las Animas County, south of Trinidad, Colorado. The Nature Conservancy and The Trust for Public Land currently own what has been historically referred to as "Crazy French Ranch" and what is currently referred to as Fishers Peak Ranch. The owners now wish to sell this property to CPW for the purposes of habitat conservation and for allowing meaningful outdoor recreation on this unique, iconic landscape.

This action would transfer fee title interest on approximately 19,200 acres of oak, pinion/juniper scrublands and subalpine forestland along with existing amenities to CPW, thereby creating our next state park. This land provides an intact landscape of variable habitat types that support a multitude of wildlife species, to include some species of concern, such as the endangered New Mexico meadow jumping mouse. The Ranch adjoins James M. John and Lake Dorothy State Wildlife Areas, as well as New Mexico's Sugarite Canyon State Park. All told, this acquisition will help connect and protect approximately 35,500 total acres of invaluable habitat. The property has existing access off Interstate 25 and boasts the potential for the first-ever public access to Fishers Peak from Colorado, an extensive network of non-motorized trails, picnicking, wildlife watching and hunting opportunities. Public access will provide a unique experience for residents and tourists alike, while helping to boost and diversify the local economy.

Colorado Parks & Wildlife respectfully requests your support for the acquisition of this property. This project is scheduled for review by the Capital Development Committee in early 2020. In preparation of that meeting, CPW requests your concurrence prior to December 20th. 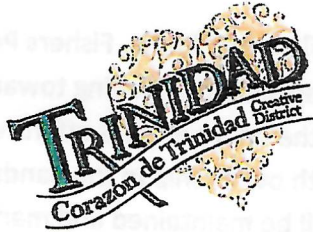

As Executive Director of the Corazón de Trinidad Creative District, I am writing to strongly support the Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) fee title acquisition of Fisher's Peak Ranch.

Over many decades, Trinidad has had a history of reinventing itself by necessity. From the Santa Fe Trail days, to mining and rail economies, to natural gas exploration, there have been numerous iterations of the community. It is experiencing yet another rebirth, based largely on outdoor recreation and the creative sector of the economy. Over the past five years, Trinidad was certified as a Colorado Creative District, was designated as a Colorado Main Street community, and was selected by Governor Hickenlooper in 2015 as the demonstration project for the Space to Create Colorado initiative. Space to Create Trinidad is a \$19 million project that will add 41 affordable live/work units in our downtown core. In addition, new hiking trails and dirt biking on our many gravel rural roads have opened new opportunities in our area.

The Creative District's mission and long-term planning includes not only support for increased business activity and economic development in the community, but also a continued and positive sense of place and appreciation for its beautiful and vital natural surroundings. At the confluence of the Sangre de Cristo range of the Rocky Mountains and the Eastern Plains short-grass prairies, and nearby lakes and rivers, Trinidad is in a perfect position to develop tourism and growth dependent on outdoor activities, conservation, agriculture, the ecology of the

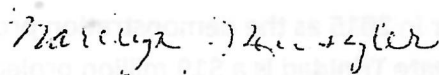
region, and protection of our water shed and native flora and fauna. Fishers Peak has long been a symbol of the region and the idea of investors and speculators moving toward housing and sub-division development of the property, changing the entire area, is offensive to the sensibility of those who live, work, and visit here. With ownership in the hands of CPW, the nature-based values of residents and visitors alike will be maintained and marketed in such a way as to celebrate and support the open space and natural draw of Colorado. Maintaining conservation values on this land will preserve its character and qualities far into the future. Trinidad is extremely grateful to the partners who have worked diligently and cautiously to bring this major project to fruition.

Trinidad offers one of the largest inventories of turn-of-the-century Victorian buildings west of the Mississippi, brick streets, a vigorous creative workforce, short-grass prairies, mountains, pristine lakes and rivers, and magnificent Dakota Wall formations. Fisher's Peak makes up the core of the surrounding natural landscape and the peak is an important symbol of Trinidad, easily recognized on the I-25 corridor between Denver and Santa Fe.

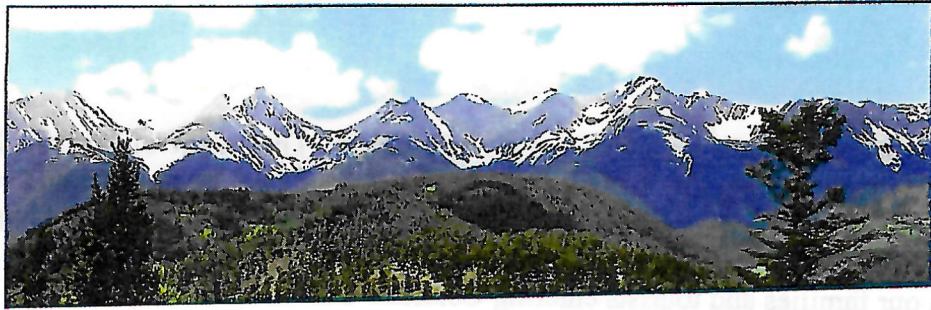

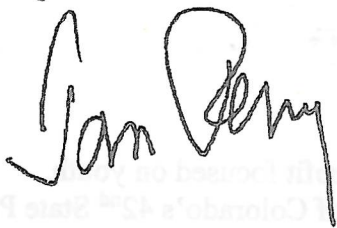

To Whom It May Concern:

The Purgatoire River Anglers Chapter of Trout Unlimited would like to offer our support to Colorado Parks and Wildlife in their efforts to preserve this incredible property and rare opportunity to achieve landscape level conservation, while providing a level of public access that would add to Colorado's conservation programs and public access.

The acquisition of the 19,200-acre property is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for the citizens and residents of Trinidad, Las Animas County and Colorado. The property includes Fishers Peak, which is visible for miles and at 9,633-feet, is the highest peak east of the I-25 corridor in the United States. Fishers Peak is an asset for the City of Trinidad, and many life-long residents are surprised to learn that the peak and most of the land along I-25 around it are privately owned.

Located just south of Trinidad and directly adjacent to I-25, and along Colorado's border with New Mexico, the property gives us the opportunity to establish a significant level of new public access. At over 19,200-acres in size and adjacent to two State Wildlife Areas (SWA), the James M. John SWA (8,200-acres) and the Lake Dorothy SWA (4,500-acres), and Sugarite Canyon State Park in New Mexico (3,600-acres), this acquisition will result in over 55.5 square miles of preserved land. Sadly, the two Colorado SWAs and Fishers Peak are only publically accessible through Sugarite Canyon State Park in New Mexico. The property also has three tributaries to Raton Creek that feeds the Purgatoire River. Protection of the watershed will further enhance the Purgatoire River through Trinidad and its recreational opportunities as well as protection of water quality.

With three of its own exits off I-25, the acquisition of the property would resolve all of the access issues at one of the main gateways to Colorado, while elevating Trinidad as an outdoor recreation tourism destination. Furthermore, the property boasts habitat to numerous globally and state ranked rare and imperiled mammals, vascular plants, reptiles and is a critical migration corridor at a nexus of a variety of ecological communities. As a result, the project will not only provide outstanding outdoor recreation opportunities, it will also help create a large "core protected area" that will compliment adjacent and nearby protected land and preserve the integrity of the overall ecological community around Trinidad.

Once the initial purchase is complete, TPL and TNC shall work with Trinidad, Las Animas County, and Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) to ensure that the property is placed under the appropriate long-term ownership and management in order to achieve our conservation and public access goals. As a result, the Crazy French Ranch acquisition is a rare opportunity to achieve landscape level ecological conservation and public access in one transaction. 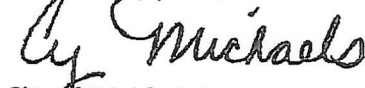

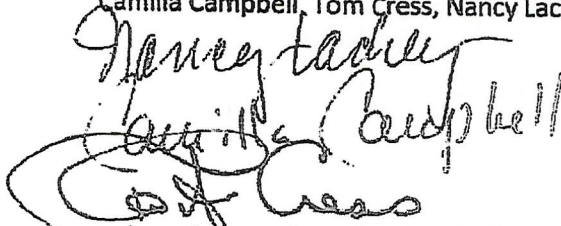

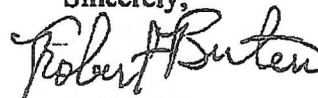

With Colorado largely shut down the typical taxes collected by small business no longer exist. The financial income of many employees will be significantly reduced due to COVID-19 and Propert tax base is also significantly reduced due to the slow and sluggish reopening the state response. Colorado has let hypochondria and paranoia rule the state and a quarter of this year has seen nothing but loss of tax revenue. Currently I advise maintaining what we have and to limit and greatly reduce any flights of fancy to reduce tax burden FY2021.
