

**HB16-1077 Created the Statutory revision committee.**

The purpose of the Statutory Revisions Committee (SRC) is to: "Recommend, upon an affirmative vote by at least five legislative members of the committee, and in accordance with subsection (3) of this section, legislation annually to effect such changes in the law as it deems necessary in order to **modify or eliminate antiquated, redundant, or contradictory rules of law and to bring the law of this state into** harmony with modern conditions."

**Colorado Statute: 24-1-136(11)(a)(I)**

Effective July 1, 1996, whenever any report is required to be made to the general assembly by an executive agency or the judicial branch on a periodic basis, the requirement for such report shall expire on the day after the **third anniversary** of the date on which the first such report is due unless the general assembly, acting by bill, continues the requirement.

**Title:** Reporting Requirements by Department of Local Affairs to General Assembly

**Bill Subject:** Local Government/State Government

**Summary:** Concerning the scheduled repeal of reports by the department of local affairs to the general assembly.

**Description:** Pursuant to section 24-1-136(11)(a)(I), Colorado Revised Statutes, any report that is required to be made to the general assembly by an executive agency or the judicial branch on a periodic basis expires on the day after the third anniversary of the date on which the first report was due, unless the general assembly, acting by bill, continues the requirement. The bill addresses reporting requirements of the department of local affairs. Sections 1, 2, and 6 repeal reports that were scheduled to repeal according to section 24-1-136(11)(a)(I). Currently there are no repeal dates listed in the organic statutes. Sections 3, 4, and 5 continue indefinitely the reporting requirements contained in those statutory sections.
