Thank you for your service to our state. My name is Janet Brazill and I support SD025 / HB1054

As a teenager back in the 1940's I watched my father die an agonizing death from Stomach Cancer. There was no hope for his survival and little treatment for the disease. He was simply sent home to die. I watched his body wither away until he was a skeleton of his former self and he finally died from the Cancer.

I remember him pleading for someone to help him die – to put him out of his misery. If he'd had the strength, he may have shot himself. It was absolutely heartbreaking to see him suffer day after day, waiting for his agonizing death.

Then, in the Seventies, I watched my sister die from cancer, and her death was not easy either, in spite of the medical advances that had been made.

The bill we are debating today is for people like my dad and my sister. They were both mentally capable of making decisions and they definitely would have chosen medical aid in dying vs those last days of suffering the effects of a wasting body.

I am happy that Montana, Vermont, California, Washington and Oregon authorize medical-aid-in-dying as a compassionate answer to such situations. Certain safeguards are, of course, necessary, and I believe that the Colorado END OF LIFE OPTIONS bill does provide those required safeguards.

I am turning ninety this year, and there is a good chance that cancer may cause my own death. I am here because I would like to know that I can look forward to a peaceful passing. And that I be the one to determine how much pain and suffering I must endure. I believe this is the good place where medical science has taken us, and I feel that having such End-of-Life choices is a basic human right. I urge you to let Colorado be the sixth state where citizens can live and die on their own terms.
