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SUBJECT: 2026 Interim Committee Information

Overview

- Currently, 25 committees are authorized to meet during the 2026 interim.
- In addition to the 25 committees, legislators may propose the creation of one-time letter interim committees. Letter interim committees are funded through the legislative budget, and must be approved by Legislative Council. In 2025, this process was suspended due to the state's budget situation.
- In 2026, most interim committees must conclude their work by October 15. Interim committee bill drafting deadlines leading up to the October 15 deadline drive the interim committee calendar.
- Options for reducing costs related to interim committees include suspending some statutory committees; not funding letter interim committees; suspending or eliminating the payment of per diem and expense reimbursement for members who serve on up to 30 entities outside of the Legislative Branch.

Statutory Interim and Year-Round Committees

Statutory Interim Committees

Statutory interim committees primarily meet during the legislative interim, and often exist for more than one year. Without action by the General Assembly during the 2026 session, 12 statutory interim committees will meet during the 2026 interim (see Attachment A).



Pending legislation creating new statutory interim committees

During the 2025 interim, the Wildfire Matters Review Committee repealed, effective September 1, 2025. Prior to its repeal, the committee recommended legislation to recreate the committee to meet during the interim annually through 2031. This bill has not yet been introduced.

Statutory interim committees set to repeal

Under current law, two committees will expire in 2026:

- Sales and Use Tax Simplification Task Force, repeals July 1, 2026; and
- Opioid and Other Substance Use Disorders Study Committee, repeals September 1, 2026.

Year-round Committees

In addition to statutory interim committees, 13 year-round committees may meet in the legislative interim (see Attachment B). These committees include legislative agency oversight committees, such as the Legislative Council, as well as the Capital Development Committee, Joint Technology Committee, and other committees.

Letter and Executive Committee Resolution Interim Committees

Letter Interim Committees

Legislators may request the creation of an interim committee to meet during a single interim by writing a letter to the Legislative Council.¹ Legislative Council determines the number of letter interim committees created each year, and how many times each committee may meet.

Legislators receive per diem and expenses for serving on letter interim committees. The Legislative Council Staff Director of Research is required to inform the Executive Committee each year how many letter interim committee meetings are authorized, based on the amount allocated in the legislative budget.² In 2024, the budget contained funding for member per diem for eight meetings with an average of eight members per committee (\$7,798). In 2025, the budget did not fund letter interim committees.

Executive Committee Resolution Interim Committees

State law permits the Executive Committee to form an interim committee after the conclusion of the legislative session.³ In recent years, the legislative budget has contained a funding set aside if a need arises to form these committees. In 2024, the budget contained funding for nine meetings with an average of six members per committee (\$6,580). In 2025, the budget contained funding for three meetings with an average of six members per committee (\$2,193).

Table 1 shows the number of authorized letter and Executive Committee resolution interim committees and meetings from 2021 to 2025.

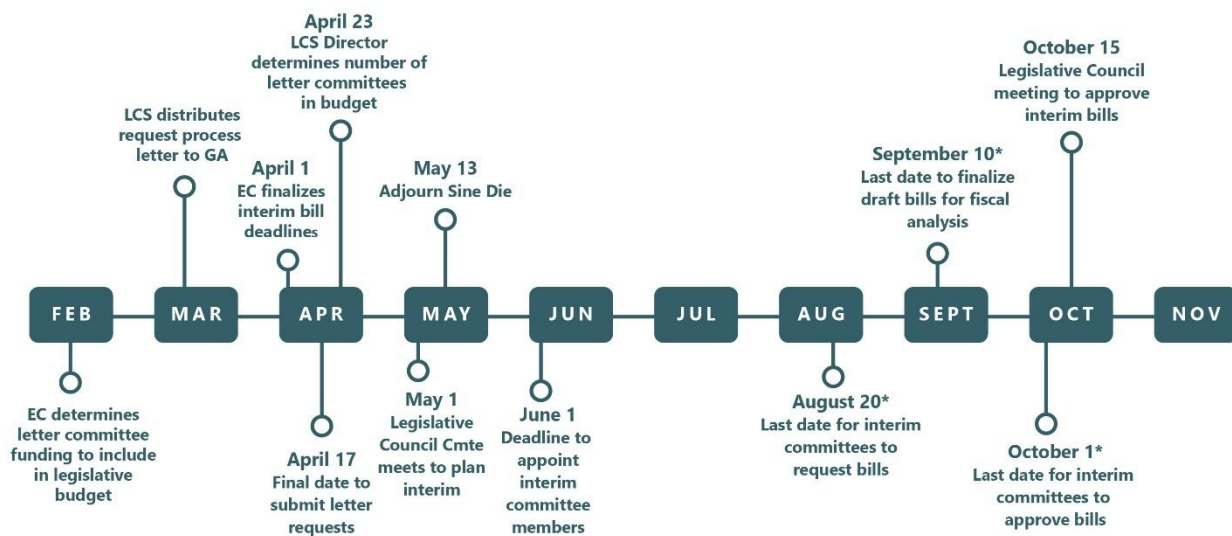

Interim Committee Deadlines

The Legislative Council must review bills recommended by letter and statutory interim committees by **October 15, 2026**.⁴ To meet this deadline, the Executive Committee of the Legislative Council annually issues deadlines for interim committees to request and approve bills. These deadlines drive the interim committee meeting calendar. Figure 1 shows the relevant dates for interim committees in 2026 (some dates are estimates).

Interim Committee Costs

Attachment C on Page 16 shows the potential per diem and travel budget for interim committees in FY 2026-27. These budget estimates assume a \$99 interim per diem. They do not incorporate the increase required by current law per the recommendations of the Independent Elected Officials Pay Commission to \$193 on January 1, 2027, since few committees meet outside of session during the second half of the fiscal year. Actual cost increases from the change in per diem are expected to be minimal and easily absorbed in FY 2026-27

2025 Budget Reductions

[Senate Bill 25-199](#) suspended several interim committees⁵ and limited travel and member reimbursements for others for the 2025 interim.⁶ The bill reduced General Fund expenditures by \$272,355 and 2.6 FTE in FY 2025-26. These actions were one-time and not ongoing, and therefore are assumed to be restored in FY 2026-27.

Interim Committee Cost-Saving Options

Continuing the provisions of Senate Bill 25-199 for another year (would require legislation).

Under current law, the budgetary actions enacted by Senate Bill 25-199 are set to unwind in 2026. The cost of restoring these actions is estimated at \$162,966 General Fund and 1.5 FTE. Thus, extending the bill for another year would save this amount in FY 2026-27.

The savings estimate for taking these same actions in FY 2026-27 is less than the savings for FY 2025-26 because some committees permanently repeal in 2026, and therefore the base FY 2026-27 budget already accounts for the savings from the elimination of these committees.

Suspending or eliminating the requirement to pay per diem and/or travel expenses to members appointed to outside entities (would require legislation).

There are at least 30 committees outside of the legislative branch on which members of the legislature are appointed to serve. Nearly all of these entities require payment of per diem and expenses for legislators. The per diem budget for serving on outside entities is approximately \$30,700 in FY 2025-26, and additional savings of approximately \$31,250 could accrue to the travel budgets of the House and Senate for eliminating the requirement to pay travel expenses for these activities. In FY 2024-25, only 7.5 percent of per diem budgeted for this purpose was actually claimed by legislators. Legislators may not realize that they are eligible for these expenses or may be unaware how to claim them since, unlike for interim committees, legislative

committee staff do not facilitate these payments. In addition, members who participate virtually in meetings do not claim travel reimbursement for participation. Bills that create new outside entities with legislator membership should be evaluated to determine if legislator representation is necessary to achieve the goals of the entity, or to explicitly waive the requirements of Section 2-2-326, C.R.S., which requires compensation for these activities. Thus far, three introduced bills create outside entities with legislative members, although some of these bills waive the payment of member per diem: [Senate Bill 26-020](#), [House Bill 26-1118](#), and [House Bill 26-1124](#).

Actual savings for suspending interim committees will vary based on which committees are suspended.

Interim Committee Cost-Increase or Cost-Neutral Options




Funding letter interim committees in FY 2026-27 (would not require legislation).

The General Assembly annually determines whether or not to fund letter interim committees. In 2025, the General Assembly did not fund letter interim committees. In 2024, the budget contained funding for member per diem for eight meetings with an average of eight members per committee (\$7,798). Funding letter interim committees in FY 2026-27 would increase costs relative to the budget for FY 2025-26.

Reducing resolution interim committees (would not require legislation).

Similar to letter interim committees, the budget does not contain funding for interim committees formed by resolution during the legislative interim. In 2025, the budget funded three meetings with an average of six members per committee (\$2,193). In 2024, the budget contained funding for nine meetings with an average of six members per committee (\$6,580). Staff recommends that at least three meetings be funded to give leadership the flexibility to respond to unexpected events.
