RE: Opposition to SB25-057 Noncitizen Voter Registration Cancellation

Chairperson Weissman and members of the Senate State, Veterans, & Military Affairs Committee,

Thank you for the opportunity to communicate our concerns and opposition to SB25-057. The Interfaith Alliance of Colorado promotes justice, religious liberty, and interfaith understanding through building relationships in order to educate, advocate, and catalyze social change. We have over 400 congregations in our statewide network, representing more than two dozen faith traditions.

As an organization focusing on justice and religious liberty, protecting and supporting our democratic systems is a key priority for the Interfaith Alliance of Colorado. However, SB25-057 appears to address a concern that we do not have evidence for, and to do so, it puts eligible voters at risk of disenfranchisement and stigmatizes immigrant communities.

We are not aware of any evidence suggesting that non-citizens are successfully registering to vote or voting in Colorado, or that existing safeguards to identify or remove ineligible voters are inadequate. However, we are aware that the rhetoric surrounding it weakens confidence in our elections and vilifies immigrants, and is being used to advance restrictive voting policies that risk the disenfranchisement of otherwise eligible voters. Those risks have played out in other states, in which eligible voters, including naturalized citizens, were removed or threatened with removal from voter rolls in recent years. That risk alone should prompt concern about the consequences of the bill.

Therefore, we must respectfully urge a No vote on SB25-057.
